



Boat Dock Facelift a Volunteer Effort

The Idaho side of the Nyssa boat docks is undergoing a facelift. Actually, the entire area is being expanded and improved.

The first development is the dredging of a 30-foot by 60-foot clearout right at the boat ramp. This is being deepened to 12 feet and the ramp will be extended farther out into the water, to make boat launchings easier.

Henry Schneider, city manager, said the project, which he is coordinating, is a joint voluntary effort on the part of many area agencies.

The North Board of Control has loaned the dredger and operator that is visible in the picture at the right. It is picking up huge handfuls of rocks and deepening the boat ramp area. The Oregon Concrete Company is donating the concrete for the ramp extension.

Steve Marez of Nyssa did the new steelwork on the dock, in his spare time from working for the city. The dock has been extended away from the shore and this will prohibit a buildup of dirt and debris around it. George

Gunn, Canyon County Marine officer raised the dock, put in new flotation material and installed wooden ramps.

Dean Winchester is grubbing the trees in the area.

Schneider stressed that the project has "cost little or no money at all" because of the volunteer work done.

The dock area project will take about two weeks to accomplish. Soon after a second phase of construction will begin and the dirty parking area will be cleaned and covered picnic tables installed. It is a "valuable adjunct to the city's recreation program," Schneider said.

Holcomb Wins Ontario City Hall Bid

Holcomb Construction Co. of Nyssa was awarded the contract to build the new Ontario city hall.

The firm submitted the low base bid and was also low bidder on several alternatives.

A bid award for \$623,673 deducted smoke detectors, heaters, black topping and giant brick. A slower elevator was substituted saving \$1,500 and the building permit cost of \$1,010 was deducted. Total deductions were \$28,890. The base bid was \$648,600.

One alternate on sidewalks, curbs, and planter curbs was accepted. Bid price by Holcomb was \$3,969.

City officials said construction was to start within five days after the contract had been awarded and completion was set at 300 days.

Your County Agent Says

Job Safety Standard Issued - OSHA set June 7, 1976 as deadline for guarding farm machinery. Includes pto drives, nip point guards, and warning signs. Workers must be taught annually how to safely operate and maintain equipment.

Ranchers this year sprayed over 6,000 acres of rangeland to control sage-brush, and as a result they can expect to harvest twice the amount of grass from the sprayed area. This results in the release of soil moisture and plant nutrients for grass growth. By proper timing this sage brush spray also controls larkspur, lupine, and rabbit brush. All three range robbers are a hindrance to proper livestock utilization of the forage on the ranges. Most advantages from spraying is received by those who select spray sites carefully with an eye to understory of good grass, good soil, and area of use. Spraying by helicopter or fixed wing aircraft both work well depending on the terrain sprayed.

Occasionally we learn of an outbreak of redwater in our cattle. This can be a very serious disease of cattle that can be controlled by vaccination. Consult your veterinarian so he can notify you if any redwater exists in cattle near you. If so - vaccinate for this disease - don't try to diagnose this disease yourself. Your veterinarian can spot it very easily and advise you on how to protect your cattle. The disease is not widespread in our area, but it does exist and is another of those things to watch out for.

Commerce Dept. Sets New Complaint Policy

Any business which fails to respond to three letters of inquiry about a consumer complaint will be classified as "unresponsive" by the Consumer Services Division of the state Department of Commerce.

Wanda Merrill, division administrator, said classification will be listed in the division's monthly publication, "Con-Coord," which is distributed to consumer groups and others throughout the state.

The new policy went into effect for complaints filed with the division after July 1.

"The least a business can do is jot a note on a letter of complaint so arbitration or resolution can be affected," she said.

When the division gets a formal complaint from a consumer, it sends a copy to the business with a request for reply. If no reply is received in ten days, a further letter is sent.

After another ten days, the division asks the consumer if there has been a settlement. If not, another letter is sent to the business. If there still is no reply, a certified letter is sent.

If there is no reply to that, the business is listed as unresponsive. "There are two sides to every question, and we are entitled to the courtesy of a reply—even if it is the famous 'nuts,'" Mrs. Merrill said.

Ore. Hells Canyon Dedication July 31

A second dedication of the Hells Canyon National Recreation Area, this time on the Oregon side of the Snake River, will be held Saturday, July 31.

A dedication was held earlier at Lewiston, Idaho.

Theodore A. Schlaffer, U. S. Forest Service, said speakers will include Oregon Congressman Al Ullman, Oregon Senator Bob Packwood, Oregon Governor Bob Straub, Walla Walla County Judge Claude Hall, and Forest Service Chief John R. McGuire.

The dedication, at Hat Point overlooking the Snake River Canyon, will be at

11:30 a.m. followed by a no-host picnic. Buses will transport participants from the Ranger Station in Joseph at 8:30 a.m. The Hat Point road will be closed to other vehicles. Buses will depart for Joseph at 1:45 and 2:45 p.m.

Some persons may wish to combine weekend activities by attending the annual Chief Joseph Days celebration, July 30-August 1, in Joseph. Schlaffer said. Because of a limit on bus seats, anyone wishing to go to the Hat Point dedication should notify the Forest Service Information Office in Portland (P.O. Box 3623) by July 21.

1 lb. ground beef
1 Tablesp. finely chopped onion
1 egg
3 Tablesp. Parmesan cheese
1 Teaspoon salt
1/4 Teaspoon marjoram or basil
1/8 Teaspoon pepper
1/3 cup milk
1 slice firm white bread, crust removed
3/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs
