40 YEARS AGO

Farmers are reporting that considerable damage has been done by rust in the wheat field especially on fields that are at all marshy or wet. In some cases the yield has been cut to less than half of the expected yield.

Over \$500 in prize money will be paid at the Nyssa Eagles Rodeo, to be held August 15 and 16, it was decided at a committee meeting Wednesday night.

This is the largest purse in the history of the rodeo, and it is expected to attract top rides, ropers, and bulldoggers here for the big two days show. Patrons will be assured of seeing the very best of them.

It was decided to pay \$50 prize each day for the best bronco riding, calf roping and bulldogging, with the second money in each event coming to \$25 and third paying \$10. In addition there will be entrance money to be divided in the calf roping and bulldogging events, and exhibition rides for the bronco busters.

The show as planned now will be two full afternoons of entertainment with something doing every minute.

50 YEARS AGO

Plans for the remaining months of the 1926 land settlement program focus at present on Eastern Oregon where effective organization by counties is already well under way and promises to match Western Oregon achievement.

Wm. M. Snyder, government hunter for this county, made a good record in number of predatory animals killed during June, although his mark was not up to the usual figure, according to a report from the Bureau of

Biological Survey and Oregon State Livestock Sanitary Board received this week. He killed ten adult coyotes and two bobcats, a total of twelve predatory animals, last month.

60 YEARS AGO

The following letters were received this week by Nyssa people from the khaki clad boys on the Mexican frontier:

I received your letters today and was awful glad to get them and the pictures. Could make out everybody but Dick Tensen. Those ears certainly look tempting. It takes 15 carloads a day to

feed Uncle Sam's outfit here. That includes gasoline, hay, forage and other supplies. They have forty-two big five-ton auto trucks hauling fourteen tons a day. It is some sight to see thousands of men dressed all alike, wagons and auto trucks the same color, at work, and one can easily see where the government spends its money. Nothing is expected in the war line. Villa and Caranza are not seven miles away from here. Last night we stayed up until 12 o'clock watching their outposts signal. We go on the border guard duty tonight at 12. I get out of it this time. I got

my third shot in the arm yesterday for typhoid. I was pretty sick this a.m. Am at the hospital now. Jupe Anderson of Parma is with the Red Cross corps. Everybody has been sick from the inoculation. You get deathly sick from the minute you get it. We are going through a federal examination today. It is very severe. There will be a bunch chopped back. We have regular army officers for drill masters now and are being put through the paces. I want to tell you.
