Sarazins Go 11,000 Miles On U.S. Tour

When Dr. and Mrs. David Sarazin and family returned home to Nyssa on July 2, their tour of the United States had taken them 11,313 miles in 46 days. They had shot 24 rolls of movies and eight rolls of snapshots.

It was the culmination of a five-year plan, which began when they bought a motor home. After putting it off and not having the time, they decided that May 17 would be the best time to go. They didn't really want to take the kids out of school, but they also didn't want to get trapped in the Bicentennial tourist crush.

An abbreviated version of their itinerary reads like this: Nyssa to Utah to Santa Fe to Austin to Houston to Galveston to Disneyworld to Miami to Williamsburg to Philadelphia to New York to Boston to Montreal to Niagara Falls to Michigan to Milwaukee to Springfield, Ill., to St. Louis to Columbia, Mo., to Kansas City, to Sioux Falls, to Mt. Rushmore to Yellowstone to Grand Teton National Park to Nyssa.

Their round trip took them around the perimeter of the continent, except the West Coast.

Some places stood out more than others—for both good and bad reasons. Even though they had seen Mt. Rushmore before, "It still stands out," Dr. Sarazin said. Todd Sarazin, who is

eight, had never seen it before and piped in that he enjoyed it, too.

Washington D. C. was another highlight. Oregon Sen. Mark Hatfield took the Sarazins on a tour through the Senate chambers. They also toured the White House. The capital was "all spruced up," Dr. Sarazin said.

New York City evoked a lot of comments. "It's a big city, I don't think I would want to live there," Dr. Sarazin declared. They were lucky enough to run into a political demonstration—always a New York highlight. Downtown Manhattan was the scene of a four-block-long procession of bicycles. Their riders chanted, "Bicycles do not pollute." The Sarazins questioned a rider about the reason for the protest. He said he didn't know; he had just seen a lot of bikes and joined the group. They never did find out the reason.

Another big city drew favorable comments: Boston. Mrs. Sarazin said, "I would have liked to stay longer in Boston. It didn't feel like it was full of people even during rush hour."

Out west they went through Yellowstone.

Dr. Sarazin said the kids, (besides Todd, they are Julie, 10; Lisa, 12; Amy, 14) were disappointed in Old Faithful. "It didn't shoot up as high as expected." He, himself, thought that a basin geyser they saw was more spec-

Fact Finding Train to Stop in Ont.

Ontario will be one of the stops of a special fact-finding passenger railroad train along the route of the proposed Portland to Ogden train on August 7.

The Amtrak board of directors is expected to arrive at a decision later this summer on whether to add this route to its nationwide network.

Amtrak representatives, Oregon transportation department officials and Oregon Historical society members and Oregon Association of Railway Passengers will make the trip. They will meet along the way with local officials and citizens who show an interest in the train.

Railway Passenger Association spokesman John Perin said, "The purpose of the special fact-finding trip is to survey potential station stops for station facilities and local interest in resumption of train service to Central and Eastern Oregon."

Other stops along the way include Cascade Locks, Hood River, The Dalles, Boardman, Pendleton, La Grande, and Baker, as well as Ontario, where the train will stop at the station.

However, a family of six can get a little cramped in a 25-foot motor home. Dr. Sarazin admitted his "trepidations about being cooped up." There were "a few arguments and fights but nothing unusual."

They already have a large scrapbook filled with memorabilia from the trip, like two "VIP" buttons, ("Visitor in Pennsylvania" and "Visitor in Petersburg") and "Union bullet from the civil war. They have postcards galore, travel brochures, restaurant menus and a lot of white spaces for the snapshots.

They saw a lot of the country during this Bicentennial summer. What is the American mood? Dr. Sarazin and Mrs. Sarazin both answered quickly: "optimistic." They said, "People were friendly." Dr. Sarazin added, "More friendly than I expected in the South and the East." The country is also a lot cleaner than in the recent past.

Of course, they didn't have enough time to spend in any of the places they visited.
