Ingalls Is New
ONPA President

— Robert C. Ingalls, editor and publisher of the Corvallis Gazette Times, was elected president of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' Association (ONPA) at the association's 89th annual convention at Salishan Lodge, July 15-17.

Active in many civic and professional organizations, Ingalls currently is a member of the State Board of Higher Education, board member of Associated Oregon Industries, Corvallis Human Resources Advisory Board, board member Forest Products Research Advisory Council, Advisory Committee: Willamette University Graduate School of Business. Past affiliations include Oregon State University Alumni Board, PTA, Junior Chamber of Commerce, UGN, OSU Foundation, Corvallis Chamber of Commerce, and Budget Committee of Corvallis Schools.

Elected to the Oregon Legislature in 1969, Ingalls was re-elected to the 1971 and 1973 sessions. He did not run for the 1975 office. In 1973, he served as Co-Chairman of the Committee on Professional Responsibility, the committee which drafted legislation on conflict of interest, lobbying, open meetings and open records.

The Corvallis publisher has also held membership and office in Sigma Delta Chi, Journalism fraternity, the American Society of Newspaper Editors, and the Oregon Press Bar Broadcasters Committee. He has served a number of years on the ONPA Board of Directors and held the office of vice-president prior to his election to the presidency.

He and his wife, Betty, have two children, Cathryn and Douglas, both married.

First National Bank Increases Earnings

First National Bank of Oregon reported an increase in earnings for the second quarter of 1976. Both deposits and loans were up compared to mid-year 1975, according to Robert F. Wallace, chairman.

The bank's total deposits were \$2,369,079,000 on June 30, compared to \$2,177,565,000 recorded at the end of the second quarter of 1975. First National's loans generated by 146 branch offices, were \$1,448,293,000, up from the \$1,353,137,000 reported on the same date in 1975.

Total loans and deposits for the second quarter of this year included \$15,234,000 in foreign loans and \$14,134,000 in foreign deposits in

First National's Cayman Island branch. The funds in the office are being used on a selected basis as an offshore depository and financing branch for the bank's business customers.

Total resources were \$3,060,180,000, up from \$2,790,959,000 on June 30 of last year.

For the second quarter, income before securities transactions was \$5,119,000, up 6.2 percent from \$4,820,000 in 1975. This amounts to 96 cents per share compared to 91 cents last year.

Income before securities transactions for the first half of 1976 amounted to \$9,685,000, or \$1.81 per share, down 3.6 percent from \$10,047,000 or \$1.89 recorded in 1975. Net income after securities transactions was \$9,616,000 or \$1.81 per share compared to \$10,064,000 or \$1.89 per share for the same period last year.

Horses Destroyed In Apple Valley Area

"Wild horses are wild animals which must be contained by strong corrals," Vale District Manager Pearl Parker said today. "Individuals who accept wild horses under the private maintenance program are liable for them and any damage they may cause," he added. "They are tough, strong animals that in most cases must be kept in wooden corrals at least six feet high for the first few months of their captivity. They are unfamiliar with wire fences, and will run through them, usually receiving severe wire cuts."
