Three Swimmers Go To Idaho State Champs

Three Nyssa swimmers have made it from the Idaho B state championships to the A state champs by bettering qualifying times in their events. Three other Nyssa swimmers who qualified will not make the trip.

Lori Lane, Bob Bass and Megan Jackson are heading to Blackfoot, Idaho, for the meet. Julie Matthews, Leslie

Lane and Mike Wahlert are not going.

Lori Lane qualified for the 15-18 year old age group in both the 100 yard and 200 yard breaststroke. She beat the 100 yard qualifying time of 1:34.5 by 10.2 seconds. She bettered the 200 yard time of 3:12.4 by almost four seconds.

Also qualifying in that age group is Megan Jackson, who will compete in the 50 yard and 100 yard freestyle. She swam a 30.2 in the 50, to beat the qualifying time of 31.3 and a 1:07.6 in the 100 to beat the 1:09.2 qualifying time.

Bob Bass also made it in the breaststroke. His time of 1:23.8 bettered the qualifying time of 1:25.2 for the boys 13-14 age group.

Of those not going, perhaps Julie Matthews has the most heartbreaking reason. She qualified in her age group, but will have a birthday the day before the meet—and she didn't meet the times of the next age group.

Nyssa's first game was the

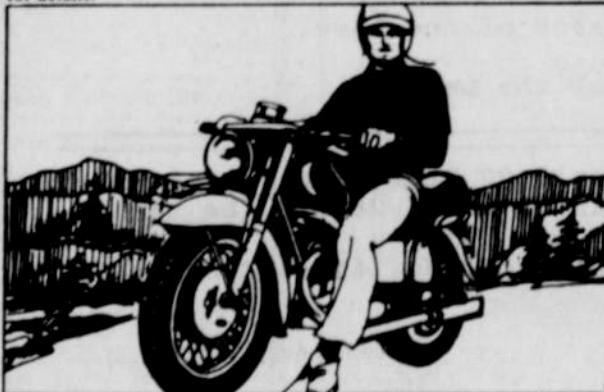
victory over Vale. That win was clinched by Scott Orris' three-hitter and a three-run six inning.

Computer

Draws

1,600 Hunters

The first real test of the Fish and Wildlife Department's new computerized controlled hunt drawing system took place Tuesday, July 20, with the selection of 1,610 hunters who will be eligible to hunt antelope this fall.

The better part of a year's work in planning and converting to the new system culminated in slightly more than three minutes of computer time. Within another 15 minutes the computer had printed out an alphabetical list of successful applicants.

Notification was mailed the next day to those people, most of whom will have received their billing for a tag by now. Only those successful in the drawing have been notified, so those who applied and have not received notice in the mail by now can assume they were one of the 12,554 who were not successful.

For anyone who wants to double check, lists of all successful applicants are available at the Fish and Wildlife Department's Portland office and six regional offices at Corvallis, Roseburg, Newport, Bend, La Grande, and Hines.

All together, applications were received from 14,164 hunters, about 1,500 fewer than applied last year.

Two judges were appointed to oversee the drawing process and insure that it was conducted properly and fairly. They were Jim Belnap, past president of the Washington County Chapter of the Izaak Walton League, and Duane Campbell, past president of the Multnomah Anglers and Hunters.

Some 700 applicants submitted five or more unsuccessful notices from previous drawings to receive priority status. All but 63 were successful in their first or second area of choice. The Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge and the Murderer's Creek antelope buck hunts were both oversubscribed by priority applicants. The 15 tags authorized for the Hart Mountain hunt went all to applicants who had submitted seven or more unsuccessful notices.

Priority applicants who were not successful in this drawing will receive their unsuccessful notices back and may use them to apply again next year or the year after.

Priority applications will only be accepted for the next two years during a phase-out and will be replaced by a three-year layout period for those successful in the elk, antelope, and cougar drawings beginning this year. There will be no waiting period for deer hunters who may apply each year regardless of previous success.

One particular advantage of the computer-based system is that cheaters can be more easily detected. No one is entitled to submit more than one application for any given species of big game in any one year. In the past, however, these were difficult to detect.

More than 250 applicants were "fingered" by the computer for submitting multiple applications or other improper applications. These people were simply disqualified and were not included in the drawing.

The next drawing, for all controlled deer, elk, cougar, and bighorn sheep hunts, will be held on August 20.
