



10 YEARS AGO

Despite blistering heat of 100 degrees (plus) for two days, rockhounds from ten states and two Canadian provinces had registered for Thunderegg Days, August 4-5-6, at the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce office by press time Wednesday night.

According to Mrs. Harold (Kay) Brendle, wife of the chairman of the event, approximately 150 people were represented in the registrations from Oregon, California, Washington, Wisconsin, Arizona, Michigan, Texas, Iowa, Illinois and Idaho; plus the Canadian provinces of British Columbia and Alberta.

At a meeting last Thursday in Nyssa, the Snake River Valley Fire Chiefs Association approved a mutual aid schedule to provide standby assistance between neighboring towns.

Chiefs and assistants represented were from Nyssa, Payette, New Plymouth, Vale and Ontario.

Harvest prospects for many of Oregon's farm products are not as bright as last year, with the exception of some berry, treefruit and vegetable crops.

Al Ullman, Democratic candidate for U. S. representative for this district is expected in Malheur county today for a three-day campaign. Tom Jones, county Democratic chairman, has arranged for Ullman to visit local packing houses in the Nyssa area and a schedule has been arranged for visits to other parts of the county.

Malheur county offers success to farmers and prospective homeseekers.

With its ideal climate, diversity of crops, bountiful yield per acre, and rich fertile soil, Malheur claims to be one of the best farming sections in the country. Irrigation has wrought the change, and now rich fields replace the sagebrush plains of other days, where the land seemed but a dry dusty stretch. There is an unlimited supply of water for farmers under the Wamsprings project. The reservoir now supplies only a few thousand acres, but as soon as the new laterals for the Vale, Oregon irrigation district are constructed, it will irrigate another 30,000 acres.

The location of the Central Oregon Highway from Bunnell Station near Vale to Harper, a distance of 15.6 miles, has been completed by J. E. Peck and party of state engineers. On Thursday the location was viewed by H. G. Smith, decision engineer of Baker.

60 YEARS AGO
