

WORCESTERSHIRE PUTS M-M-M INTO BARBECUED MEATS



"M-M-M! Whatever did you do to this meat? It's marvelous!" Chances are they won't believe you when you tell them: "Just a little tomato, orange juice and Lea & Perrins sauce!" Of course, the real secret is that the Worcestershire is a seasoning shelf in itself.

Its blended aroma makes it unnecessary to carry a big trayful of different seasonings to the cookout.

SKEWERED STEAK AND VEGETABLES

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| 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 1 can (6 oz.) frozen concentrated orange juice, thawed | 1 1/2 pound beef flank steak |
| 1/4 cup original Worcestershire sauce | 1 box cherry tomatoes |
| 2 tablespoons salad oil | 2 medium zucchini, cut into 1/2-inch slices |
| | 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, halved |

Combine tomato sauce, orange juice, Worcestershire sauce, oil and salt. Remove 1 cup; set aside. Refrigerate remaining 1 cup in a tightly covered container for later use as a barbecue sauce. Thinly slice flank steak on the diagonal. Place in a snug-fitting bowl. Pour reserved 1 cup sauce over meat, stirring to coat all pieces of meat. Cover and refrigerate overnight. On skewers thread a slice of meat alternately around a cherry tomato, slice of zucchini and a mushroom half. Repeat using all of meat and vegetables. Brush any sauce remaining in bowl over vegetables. Grill over hot coals or broil under a preheated hot broiler until cooked as desired, about 3 minutes on each side, brushing with any remaining marinade. Yield: 4 to 6 portions (2 cups barbecue sauce).

Your County Agent Says

Onion White Rot Program:

At the annual Onion Growers Meeting last February, the growers recommended that the Board of Directors investigate some possibilities of setting up some form of district to prevent the entry of white rot into our production area. The Board of Directors have met several times since this to discuss this issue. A proposal has come out of these meetings and will be put together at another meeting being held on July 27, at the Charolais Restaurant in Ontario at 7:30 p.m. The plan has basically three points. They are:

(A) Prohibit the importation into the control area of any vegetative propagation material, or limit importation of such to material which is certified to have been produced in white rot free area.

(B) Permit the use of seed only for commercial onion production with the exception of sets produced in Treasure Valley.

(C) Require steam removal of all adherent soil on any equipment brought into the control area from any onion production area outside a Malheur white rot control area.

Jim Burr, Malheur Extension Agent, encourages all onion growers to contact their local board member and share their ideas with them on or before the 27th, so this program can have all the inputs possible to make it effective. Remember that Oregon has no regulation and Idaho has one that covers the whole state and is very difficult to police. We are hoping to get something put together that could apply on both sides of the river and be effective. Your comments are requested!

As combining time draws nearer we should start thinking about grain storage. A real problem can be prevented by properly cleaning your grain storage facilities. To get rid of carryover weevil and other grain pests, a thorough cleaning is essential—removing all old grain residue, dirt, sacks and etc.

Then spray the storage facility with a good insecticide such as Malathion or diazinon.

Bratton Stresses Equity In Property Assessment

At a luncheon speech given before the Ontario Rotary Club, Wednesday, Malheur County Assessor Oscar Bratton declared that each taxpayer has the right to be fully informed as to his property assessment. Bratton said that although somewhat complicated, the work of appraising and assessing is not a secret process and he believed that if fully informed the taxpayer would have confidence that his office had but one goal in mind—equity—each taxpayer paying only his fair share.

Bratton emphasized that the Assessor's job is big business and that the 1974 Malheur County assessment roll was nearly 386 million dollars or more than 1/3 billion and that the taxing bodies submitted approved operating budgets for nearly 7 1/2 million dollars.

Bratton outlined how he had re-organized the Assessor's office after taking office and set up an appraiser training program to fill office vacancies.

Bratton stated that Oregon is considered to be one of the best, if not the best, states in regard to local property tax assessment and that recent laws passed by the Oregon legislature, although making his job more difficult, have resulted in better equity.

Onion Growers Ballot On Changes Due Monday

Onion growers are reminded that ballots in the referendum on the proposed amendments to the Onion Marketing Agreement and Order program must be mailed to the Portland Office of the U. S. Department of Agriculture by August 9. This announcement was issued this week by Jim Burr, County Agricultural Agent.

Ballots and voting instructions have been made available at the office of the County Agricultural Agent for any grower who did not receive a ballot by mail, along with a self-addressed return envelope for mailing of ballots.

All producers may participate in the referendum. owner-operators, renters, and landlords who receive onions as rent for land on which onions were grown, are defined as producers for the referendum. Business

units such as partnerships, father-son partnerships, corporations, estates, firms, etc., may cast but one vote, but each separate business entity is entitled to a ballot.

Growers are urged to cast their ballots so that the result of the referendum may be truly representative. Under the provisions of the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act, the Secretary of Agriculture may issue the amendments only if two-thirds of the growers, either by number or volume, voting in the referendum, favor them.

The proposed amendments in summary would:

1. add production research authority to the existing marketing research and development authority; and
2. allow the onion committee to accept voluntary contributions.

Oregon Cow Population Same as Last Year

The total of cattle and calves on hand in Oregon on July 1 is estimated to be 1.7 million head, the same as last year. Oregon Crop and Livestock Reporting Service also estimates Oregon beef cows at 650,000 head, down two percent from last year.

Other classes on July 1 and the change from the year earlier are as follows, milk cows, 90,000 head, down one percent; beef replacement heifers over 500 pounds at

94,000 head, unchanged; milk replacement heifers over 500 pounds at 25,000 head, unchanged; other heifers over 500 pounds at 72,000 head, up 29 percent; steers over 500 pounds at 190,000 head, up 12 percent; bulls over 500 pounds at 39,000 head, unchanged; steers, heifers and bulls over 500 pounds at 540,000 head, down 4 percent.

Oregon's 1976 calf crop is expected to total 645,000 head, down two percent.

Nyssa Gets \$17,472 In Highway Funds

The City of Nyssa has received \$17,472.25 from the State of Oregon highway division for use in local road, street and park programs.

It is part of a total of \$8,389,497.78 distributed to incorporated cities in the state. The money came from highway-user tax funds.

The allocation is based on the statutory 12 per cent, and

is distributed on a monthly basis as a result of action taken during the 1975 legislative session. It went to 240 incorporated cities in Oregon whose combined population now totals 1,334,676.

The funds come from the following sources: motor vehicle registration and operator's license fees, gasoline tax, use fuel tax, motor carrier fees, and fines and

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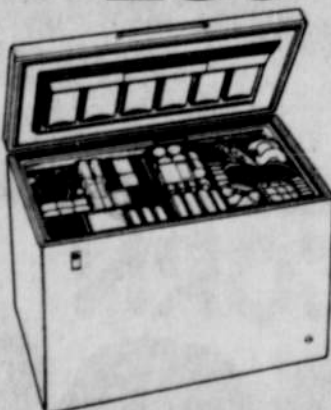
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
