The season for cattle losses from pulmonary emphysema is here. As cattle come off a dry range onto lush green feed, this malady often strikes. It is not a contagious disease but one somehow connected with nutrition. It is the result of rapid change in feed from dry to green lush growth. Management seems to give the best answer. A source of dry feed for awhile after turn in to green feed helps. Rapid movement of cattle off of green feed when the first symptoms appear is a good idea. Your Property Taxes

Since the Assessor is required to take an oath of office swearing that he will uphold the laws of Oregon, let us explore some of the most commonly referred-to laws.

One of the corner stones of the assessment laws is ORS 308.232, "All real or personal property within each county shall be assessed at 100 percent of its true cash value."

ORS (Oregon Revised Statute) 309.035 requires the Department of Revenue to examine the assessment roll to see if the Assessor is meeting the requirements of ORS 308.232. This law amended by the 1975 Legislature requires that the

Assessor have an over-all ratio of 95 percent or better. This means that for a class of property (residential, commercial etc.) to comply with the overall ratio requirement it must be within 5% of the sale price. The method of measuring this is simply the percentage the appraised value is of the sale price. Example: a house selling for \$20,000 to be within 5% of the 100% must have an appraisal of \$19,000. \$19,000 divided by \$20,000 is 95%.

When the property is in a current reappraisal area, it will be reappraised, if not then sufficient sales indicate a trend upwards the whole area will receive a blanket adjustment upwards to bring the class of property in the area into compliance

with this law. If the Assessor fails in his duty and does not act, then the Department of Revenue under ORS 309.035 orders the Assessor to bring the value up, not to the 95% but to the 100% mark. Thus by the lack of action by the Assessor higher values than necessary are placed upon the property creating a hardship upon the taxpayer.
