Environmentalists Win Again

The environmentalists have won again!

This time they have succeeded in closing the sawmill at McCall, one of Boise-Cascade's most efficient operations. This means a loss of jobs for 148 workers in the mill, plus many more loggers, truck drivers and allied workers. Can you imagine the impact that this will have on a small city of 1700 population? Schools, businesses, and the economic stability of the town are at stake.

What seems even more serious to us is that efficient management of our forests on a knowledgable, scientific basis has to give way to a shortrange, emotional approach by the Sierra Clubbers and others.

It's nice to look at the pine trees now, but it seems to us that a long-range planned harvesting and reforestration program makes more sense over the long haul; and that is exactly what the Forest Service, Boise-Cascade, Georgia-Pacific, Weyerhauser and others have been doing.

We think that the opportunities afforded by good forest management are more important in the long run to our children and their children, and generations beyond that; and should take priority over the immediate desires of these people who like to take hikes and commune with nature.

They apparently would prefer to see the forests destroyed by lightning, bugs, and their man-made forest fires; rather than systematic cutting and regrowing of trees for the generations to come.

Who will provide the jobs, the lumber, and the recreation for the generations coming up? Most of us who are here now will survive, but our children will need the benefits of the lumber industry, our largest part of the economy of the Pacific Northwest states.

We think that the U. S. Forest Service, and the various State's Forest Services, have done a reasonably good job of managing our forest lands for the multiple uses of lumbering. agriculture and recreation.

We also think that our timber industry is doing a responsible job in providing lumber, jobs, and the needs of future generations.

This would seem a good area to let the professionals do their job without our interference. Right now they are getting too much interference, and we are going to suffer for it.
