How the West was Won, or East Beats West 14-6 in Baker

While it would have been better for the local point of view if Bill Marcum had caught three touchdowns, or Joe Joyce had picked up a fumble and run 85 yards for a score in the recent Shrine All-Star game in Baker, the fact is, they didn't.

But, that doesn't mean they didn't play solid, hard-hitting games for the East. They did. It's just that the East ran more than passed, and left split end Marcum standing alone in the rain. Also, defensive lines tend to blur together, and Joyce was hard to find in the crush, even if it did put a stop to what was supposed to have been a potent West running attack.

Larry Lewis, Vale, is the nearest to a local "hero" Nyssa has. He was the game's most valuable player, a position bestowed upon him by the working press present at the game. Somehow this writer didn't get a ballot to cast. However, I probably would have voted for him myself. He led the East's running attack, and while he didn't score either of the East's touchdowns, when gained, he gained it, 103 yards worth in 19 carries.

The final score was 14-6. The West scored its only touchdown in the first half. The extra point was blocked, and for a while it looked as if it would be important. That was when the East had a slim 7-6 lead in the third quarter.

The West's score came on a 28-yard pass from Brody Guthrie, South Umpqua, to Brad Wilson, Siuslaw. Wilson snuck off the West's bench, in a play which is still being disputed. No one picked him up as he slanted into the left corner. He caught the lobbed pass near the 10-yard line and could have walked into the end zone. It capped a 55-yard drive in which the West moved easily on the ground.

It turned out to be their only successful drive. The

teams spent the rest of the first half trading punts. The East halted one West drive, and rhythmic clapping on the West bench, with a stiff defensive line and a good play by Marcum. On fourth down and eight yards to go, Wilson caught a short pass, but Marcum halted his progress with a sure tackle and denied the West a first down, deep in East territory.

Halftime was busy with pageantry of many types. It ranged from the auction of a steer, which netted \$1,800, to a drill team of Shriners who performed under black lights and in day-glo costumes.

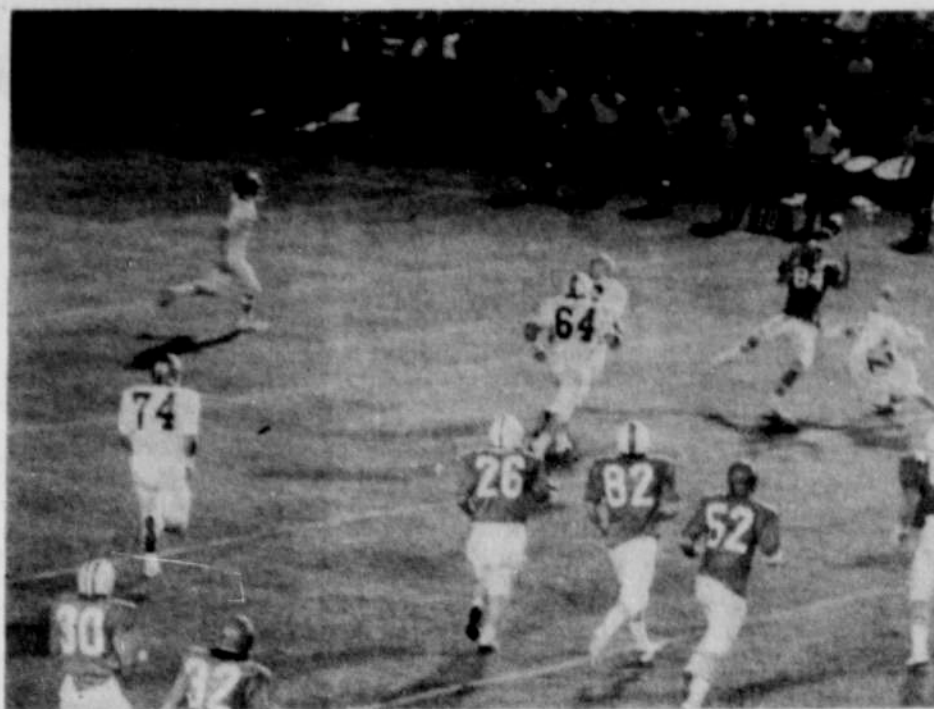
The second half showed a different East team. After the game they said they had changed little in their attack, but they sure seemed changed. They took a poor West punt and capitalized on it—something they could not successfully do in the first half. They drove from the West's 40-yard line right into the end zone with a punishing ground game. It featured Lewis who ran some beautiful end sweeps around the left side. Stub Turner, St. Mary's, Medford, punched the ball over from the 2-yard line on fourth down.

The West mounted only one strong drive in the entire second half. It began after John Kelly, Astoria, intercepted a pass meant for Marcum. They reached the East's 39-yard line. You could hear Arnold Lewis of Vale, the East coach, yelling hoarsely all the way across the field. "You can't let them go any further!" They didn't. Mark Ball, Elgin, lunged to knock down a pass which could have been a score. And on fourth down on the East 35, the defense tightened up and held. The West raised little fuss after that.

The East's final score was merely icing on the cake. Once again Lewis led them downfield and Turner scored.

Marcum and Joyce saw a lot of action. Marcum played both split end and defensive halfback. He got into quite a few heavy bumping contests with the West ends. Joyce played on the defensive and offensive lines. He alternated at guard with Jim Federico, Turner, and brought in plays to the quarterback. Dean Knowles of Oakridge, the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Knowles of Nyssa, saw little time at quarterback, but he did play.

Before the game, at halftime and again at the end of the game, Shriners spoke at length about crippled children and their hospitals. They exhorted people to eat at the concessions—the profits of which were being

The crowd of 3,552 seemed to enjoy the game—until it began to rain. Then half the crowd continued to enjoy the game; they were under a roof. The other half—most of whom were East team supporters—started covering up.

Before the game began, the West team charged out on the field, roaring and snorting like a pack of bulls. They jumped up and down in a tight circle of pressed-together heads and bodies. The East team, on the other hand, came out looking more calm and relaxed. And in the end, it was the East who had kept its collective head, while the West's energy dissipated into the cool, wet, night air of Baker.

Five standard events are scheduled, each with a

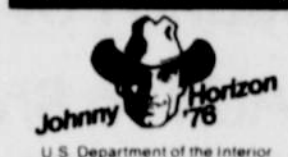
