

Out Of The Past

10 YEARS AGO

Four young ladies of the Nyssa-Adrian area are among nine candidates from whom one will be selected to reign as Miss Malheur County.

Holder of the royal title will be revealed by the Jaycee, Jay-C-Ette-sponsored pageant to be staged at 8 o'clock Saturday evening, Aug. 20, in the Ontario high school auditorium.

Among the judges for the event will be Mrs. Agnes Lynch, former publisher of the Ontario Argus-Observer, now an official of the Silver Sage Girl Scout council and a resident of Boise.

Others will be Mrs. Robert Howard, field director of the Miss Oregon pageant, from La Grande; Jerry Begwert, vice president of Weiser Chamber of Commerce; Robert Hall, Payette C of C president; and Corky Corbett, past president of the Oregon Jaycees, of Burns.

Master of ceremonies will be Clint Bellows, new owner-manager of Payette radio station KYET.

20 YEARS AGO

Malheur County ranks first in Oregon and near the top in the nation among counties selling cattle and calves on farms at census time, according to figures just released by the bureau of census.

Gene Stunz returned Sunday from a 57-day cruise aboard the aircraft carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt that left Bremerton, Wash., June 14, sailed around South America and completed its tour at Jacksonville, Fla., a total distance of about 20,000 miles.

A lieutenant in the 13th Naval Reserve district, Stunz was one of six from the Boise headquarters and one of 450 west coast reserve officers to be chosen for the cruise. He described the carrier as large enough for three football fields on the flight deck and stated that original cost of the ship was \$350,000,000 with a value of about one-half billion dollars if built now. It recently underwent a two-year rebuilding job at Bremerton at a cost of \$50,000.

Described as a regular city the ship had 4000 men on the cruise and many officers of the regular personnel had their own cars with them.

30 YEARS AGO

The city council voted at a meeting Tuesday night to buy two drinking fountains for Nyssa's main street. One fountain will be installed between First and Second streets and one between Second and Third streets.

The fountains will be of the vitreous china round and pedestal type. They will be installed this fall.

One hundred and forty-four Ontario and Nyssa citizens received certificates of awards August 1 from President Truman and the office of price administration as an expression of gratitude for "selfless service in your country's need as a volunteer worker," reports J.L. Turnbull, chairman of the Ontario area price control board.

As in most other towns in the nation, business was conducted as usual in Nyssa yesterday, August 14, the first anniversary of the conclusion of the war with Japan.

A mass meeting was held at council chambers Wednesday evening to discuss the matter of improving Main street at a cost of about \$2000. The consensus of opinion seemed to be in favor of the proposed improvement. There is some objection voiced to the proposition, however, on the ground that using such an amount of money for this purpose would deplete the road fund to such an extent that no other streets could be improved for a long time. There is some merit in this contention, provided the money for the improvement is taken from the general fund. However, this objection could be overcome by requiring that the property facing the improved street pay the cost of the improvement. This is customary in street improvements and is equitable as the adjacent property receives the direct benefit of such improvement.
