Your Property Taxes

Occasionally a taxpayer will confront the assessor with the true cash value referred to in ORS 308.232 "All real and personal property within each county shall be assessed at 100% of its true cash value," as meaning cash in hand insuring that cash and only cash is an acceptable measure of value.

True cash value has been defined by the Legislature in ORS 308.205, "True cash value of all property, real and personal, means market value as of the assessment date. True cash value in all cases shall be determined by methods promulgated by the Department of Revenue. With respect to property which has no immediate

market value, its true cash value shall be the amount of money that would justly compensate the owner for loss of the property."

PASTAS BOLSTER EASY BUFFETS



Buffets or barbecues, the "serve-it-yourself way" is
America's favorite form of entertaining. Easy on the hostess,
they allow those with hearty appetites to select as much

Here's two great pasta dishes; they cost under two dollars
a piece for six servings.

SPICY SAUCE IN SPAGHETTI RING

1/2 lb. weiners, sliced
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 package (19-1/2 oz.) Chef Boy-ar-dee Complete
Spaghetti Dinner with Meat Sauce
1 tablespoon pickle relish

Saute weiners in 1 tablespoon butter. Add 1 tablespoon
onion and continue sauteing until lightly browned. Add

package directions; drain. Saute remaining onions in re-

mold. Bake at 375° oven for 10 minutes. Unmold spaghetti.
Place sauce in bowl. Arrange in center of spaghetti ring.
Garnish with halved artichoke hearts and carrot strips.
Serves 6.

'GETTI-GARDEN VEGETABLE MIX

1 package (10 oz.) frozen mixed vegetables
3 tablespoons chopped onion
1 teaspoon garlic salt
1 can (17 oz.) kidney beans
1 can (15 oz.) Chef Boy-ar-dee Beef-O-Getti

Cook frozen vegetables according to package directions.
While they are cooking, add chopped onion. Drain; add
garlic salt. Wash and drain kidney beans. Combine all
ingredients. Simmer for 10 minutes over low heat.
