Bratton Starts Election Campaign

At a noon meeting Monday of the Vale Chamber of Commerce, Malheur County Assessor Oscar Bratton officially kicked-off his campaign for re-election to the position which he has held for the past nearly four years.

Bratton told the chamber members that Malheur County is growing at an increasingly rapid rate, and that property transfers are arriving at his office at nearly 200 a month.

"A good administrator must have the ability to correctly delegate responsibility and authority," Bratton stated, "under this concept I have appointed a Deputy Assessor and re-established the position of Chief Appraiser. Each of my employees is trained to do their special part in the assessment process. The citizens of Malheur County want fairness and equity in their tax administration, and this is my goal," Bratton emphasized.

Bratton touched upon appeal rights. It is the right of every taxpayer to appeal his property assessment if he so desires. The assessor's office is the first place to appeal

and the taxpayer may go as high as the Oregon Supreme Court if he wishes. An assessor also has these same appeal rights, and if at anytime he feels an in-equity has been created it is his responsibility to the state laws and to you fellow taxpayers to try to correct the assessment and restore equity.

Bratton further stated that the Oregon Department of Revenue has general supervision and control over the administration of the assessment and tax laws to assure that all taxable property is assessed uniformly according to the law and equality of taxation according to law is secured. Bratton quoted one of several statutes that gives them the right to enter any assessor's office at any time and examine his work to see

if he is in accordance with law.

This year's budget demands from taxing districts such as schools, cities, county, roads and others will be over eight million dollars. It is the assessor's job to see that the appraisals and assessments within these taxing districts are fair and uniform according to law. Bratton emphasized that Malheur County voters should carefully consider the man that they would thrust this tremendous responsibility upon that he be thoroughly capable when they cast their vote for assessor on the November 2 election.
