Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Vaughan of Elgin spent the weekend with their daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Ray White and family.

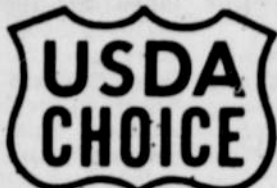
Mr. and Mrs. Frank Rhodes found the owner of the lost dog. It belonged to Harold Bashaw on Kingman road. It is fifteen years old.

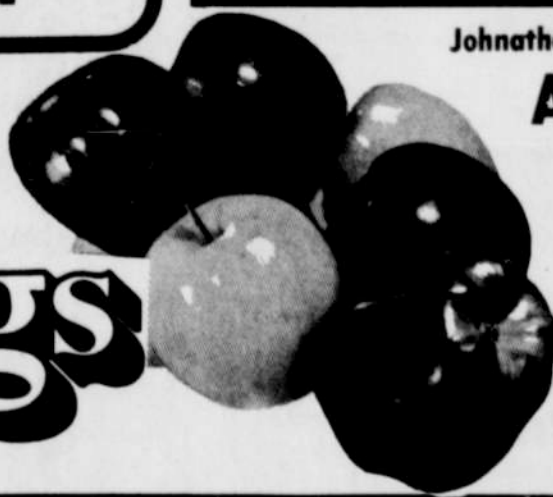
