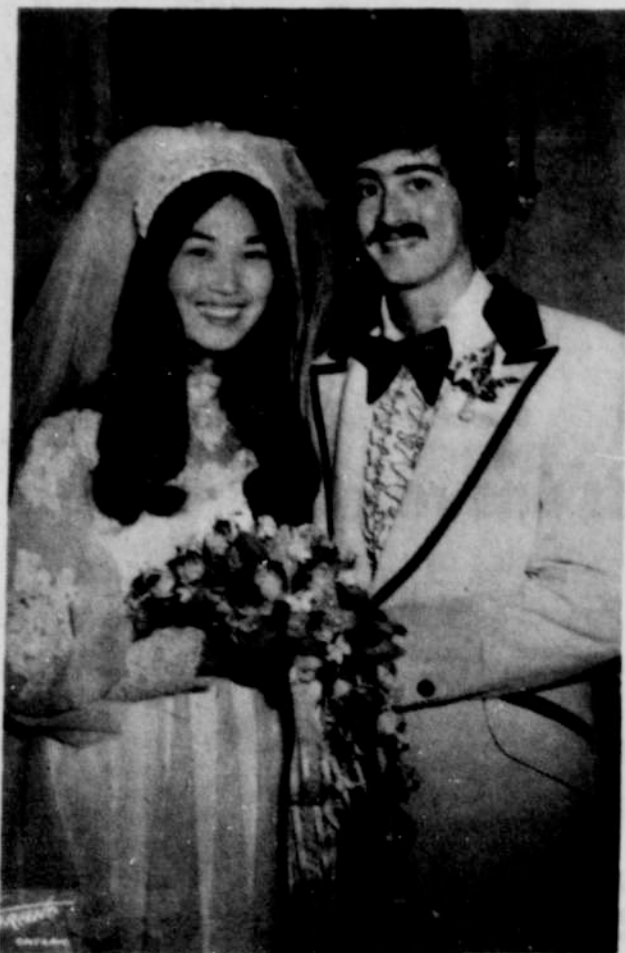


**Mint Green - Yellow Theme of Saito - Carlson Rites**

A center pyramid brass candelabra with mint green tapers, flanked by spiral candelabra and beauty baskets of yellow gladioli and green spider cysanthemums decorated the Ontario Community Methodist Church for the Sunday, September 5, 1976 wedding of Jan Saito of Eugene, Oregon and Jeff Carlson of Clatskanie, Ore. The pews were decorated with mint green and yellow bows.

Officiating at the 3:30 p.m. double ring ceremony in the presence of 200 guests was the Rev. Eugene Sabin, Forrest Grove, Oregon, uncle of the groom, assisted by the Rev. Mas Kawashima.
