Soviet Naval Objectives

"When in the past a country with few overseas financial or colonial interests has embarked on the building of a considerable fleet, the true aims of the ships concerned have proved to be not only protection of the homeland and the sea lines of communication which run to it but also aggressive activities designed to support national policy."

So speaks the new 1976-77 edition of Jane's Fighting Ships in its comments on the Soviet naval building program. "Admiral Gorshkov has made it quite clear that he considers the fleet which he commands as an essential element of the political advance of his country," Jane s adds.

The for word to the latest edition of Jane's stresses the great reliance of NATO nations on ocean trade, pointing out that at any one time there are over 4,000 merchant ships plying between their ports in addition to some 3,000 ships within those ports. Oil comes to these nations in tankers, of which 200 are daily at sea in the Indian Ocean. He who has the capacity to interrupt this commerce will be in a commanding position to achieve his ends, even though no shot or torpedo is ever fired. This seems to be the Soviet objective as they establish naval bases or friendly havens in such diverse places as Cuba, North Africa, Guinea, Somalia, and Aden. Meanwhile, their squadrons sail into all the waters of the world.

With one Soviet carrier now operational, a second nearly so, and two more building, it is unmistakably evident that Russia is no longer prepared to concede U.S. naval superiority in any category of ship. The U.S. naval mission of protecting our overseas supply lines and providing for the maritime support of our far flung allies is clearly in jeopardy.

Honest debate may flourish over just what mix of ships we need, but there can be no doubt that we face a serious and growing naval challenge that must be fully met if we are to maintain our credibility and deterrence.

Nurses are doing breast examinations and teaching self breast examination. Mammography is also being done.

Mammography To Continue At B.C.D.C.

The question of whether mammography should be included in breast cancer screening programs for women under 50 years of age was the focus of a conference in Bethesda, Maryland, July 19, 1976. The meeting was called by the National Cancer Institute which cosponsored the 27 Breast Cancer Detection Centers with the American Cancer Society. Each of these centers are screening 10,000 asymptomatic women for five year, each with a five year follow-up.

In the early 1960's, a research study in New York City on 66,000 women was done to determine if the addition of yearly mammography in addition to physicrease the death rate of breast cancer. They found a one third decrease in women over 50 years of age who had mammography. No decrease was found in women 35-50 vears of age.

Dr. Diane Fink reported that on the initial examination at the twenty-seven Breast Cancer Detection Centers, 836 breast cancers had been found. 223 of these were detected in women 35-49 years of age. In 100 women the breast cancers were detected by mammography alone.

Through continued technological improvement radiation dosage required for mammography has been steadily reduced. Today ex-

posure per examination can be less than one rad. Each week in all the centers the radiation level used is checked. In the last year alone the dosage has been decreased

The Idaho Breast Cancer Detection Center will continue to do mammography yearly on our 10,000 screenees. One in fifteen women will develop breast cancer before they are 65. We have no better way at present of finding breast cancer early when ten year life expectancy is over 85%. From our research we are developing risk factors for breast cancer. There is a risk to all radiation including that from the sun. Dr. Philip Strax, director of the New York Detection Center stated, "The real risk is not doing mammography."


