Your County Agent Says

From Soil Science Magazine via Colliers Tech Check this note on ammonia fertilizer will be of interest: When NH_3 becomes NH_4 , Anhydrous and aqua ammonia (with that la ending) have three hydrogens for every nitrogen (NH_3). All our other ammoniac-N type fertilizers, such as ammonium phosphates and ammonium sulfate (note that lum ending), have four hydrogens as indicated by NH_4 .

Both anhydrous and aqua ammonia must pick up the extra hydrogen and become NH_4 compounds before they are available for plants and before the bacteria can convert them by nitrification to the mobile nitrate-N form. Therefore, we are interested in how soon the conversion takes place in the soil by which NH_3 picks up its extra H.

Recently reported research from laboratory work by T.V.A. concludes that this change probably continues over a period of days or weeks as the ammonia moves outward from the point of injection. This time requirement must in part explain the initial time lag which is observed in ammonia use. This is one reason that ammonia bands last as long as they do.

... We hear much about the preconditioning of calves in recent years. Sounds complicated doesn't it? Not so! Many of you have been doing it for years. It is simply protecting those calves from all factors causing losses for which there is a vaccine or treatment. It could well mean vaccination for shipping fever, red nose, virus diarrhea plus spraying for lice and grubs. It can be more inclusive in areas of need, such as for red-water, drench for worms, etc.

In any event if you do it and keep it a secret you benefit in only those calves you keep. Many buyers will pay extra for pre-conditioned calves if they are told about it. So - if you pre-condition your calves, tell potential buyers. You spend a year producing a crop of calves so spend an extra few minutes in selling those calves. Tell your story. Reputation calves nearly always bring a premium.

If you're going to pre-condition the calves don't double stress them by vaccinating, etc. at weaning - do it early and then get those calves back with the cows to avoid the extra stress.

Oregon Farm Bureau Supports Measures

Oregon Farm Bureau Federation's board of directors on September 7 voted support of five of the 12 measures to appear on the November general election ballot, rejected five, and took no position on the two remaining.

Among those approved by the board was measure 10, which would repeal land use planning coordination statutes. However, the board expressed its continuing support of land use planning under county and local control, according to Farm

Bureau President Waldron Johnson.

Also voted support were ballot measure one, which validates statutory amendments which are superseded by oversight; measure four, which repeals the emergency succession provision; measure six, which allows "church bingo," and measure 12, which repeals intergovernmental cooperative and planning district statutes.

The board acted to oppose

ballot measure two, which allows changing of city and county election days; measure three, which would lower the minimum age for legislative service to 18; measure seven, which would allow partial public funding of state election campaigns; measure nine, which regulates nuclear power plant construction approval, and measure 11, which would prohibit adding fluorides to community water supply systems.

The vote on the nuclear

farmers' need for a continued and expanding capacity to generate electric power. This takes into consideration the end of expansion of hydroelectric power sources in the Pacific Northwest, Johnson said.

No position was taken by the Farm Bureau board on measure five, which permits the legislature to call itself into session, and on measure eight, which increases motor fuel and ton-mile taxes.
