

OUT OF THE PAST

10 YEARS AGO
Paul House, manager of the North Board of Control for the past 17 years, submitted his resignation to the board Tuesday night, following a joint meeting with the South Board of Control at Nyssa.

The long-time, popular manager is accepting a similar position with the Quincy-Columbia Basin Irrigation district with headquarters in Quincy, Wash. The new job will entail management of a 23,000 acre project (about three times the size of the local one) and House said "Besides the challenge it was a decided increase in pay that I couldn't afford to reject."

20 YEARS AGO
It felt like winter and looked like winter for a brief period Thursday afternoon when the area around Nyssa was subjected to a torrential "hailpour" which followed a swirling dust storm.

The 1956-57 sugar campaign got into full swing at 6 o'clock Tuesday evening when slicing started at Amalgamated for nearly a five-month's operation, it was announced Wednesday by Jed Lewis, district manager of the sugar company.

More than 400 persons are employed at the Nyssa factory and its receiving stations for a total weekly payroll of approximately \$45,000, Lewis said.

Owen Gann of Nyssa has killed the largest deer that was dressed at the Polar Cold Storage plant this season up to Wednesday noon. The animal weighed 175 pounds dressed.

40 YEARS AGO
The sugar beet harvest near Nyssa started Monday when the first beets were received at the piler located near the Dale Grrrison home south of Nyssa. Beets have been coming from Garrison, Tigart and Wm. DeGroff fields with yields very satisfactory. The first beets from the DeGroff field, and to Bill they were the poorest he has, are averaging 18 tons to the acre.

With nearly 600 acres to be harvested in the Nyssa section, the piler is expected to be kept busy from now until late November. Beet toppers are receiving 65¢ per ton for topping and employment is being given several men.

Major Oregon News this week was the destruction of the town of Bandon by fire. Forest fires which started over the weekend got out of control in a high wind Sunday and wiped out the entire town of Bandon, with a loss in excess of a million and a half Bandon's entire population of 1500 was homeless in the midst of smouldering wreckage.

Eighteen miles inland from the seaside town, flames burned structures on the outskirts of Coquille, Marshfield and North Bend, but are now under control.

50 YEARS AGO
The proposed contract, after certain preliminary recitals defines "old lands" "new lands," and "supplemental lands" of the Owyhee Project. Old lands are lands which have been receiving their water supply by pumping from the Snake River, but which will receive their water supply from the Owyhee Project after it is constructed, and which will use the project canal and reservoir systems. New lands, as the term indicates, will rely upon the project exclusively for their water supply and irrigation system. Supplemental lands have their canal system constructed at the present time, but will obtain stored water from the Owyhee Project. The construction charge of the old lands is to be \$15 per acre less than the construction charge for the new lands.

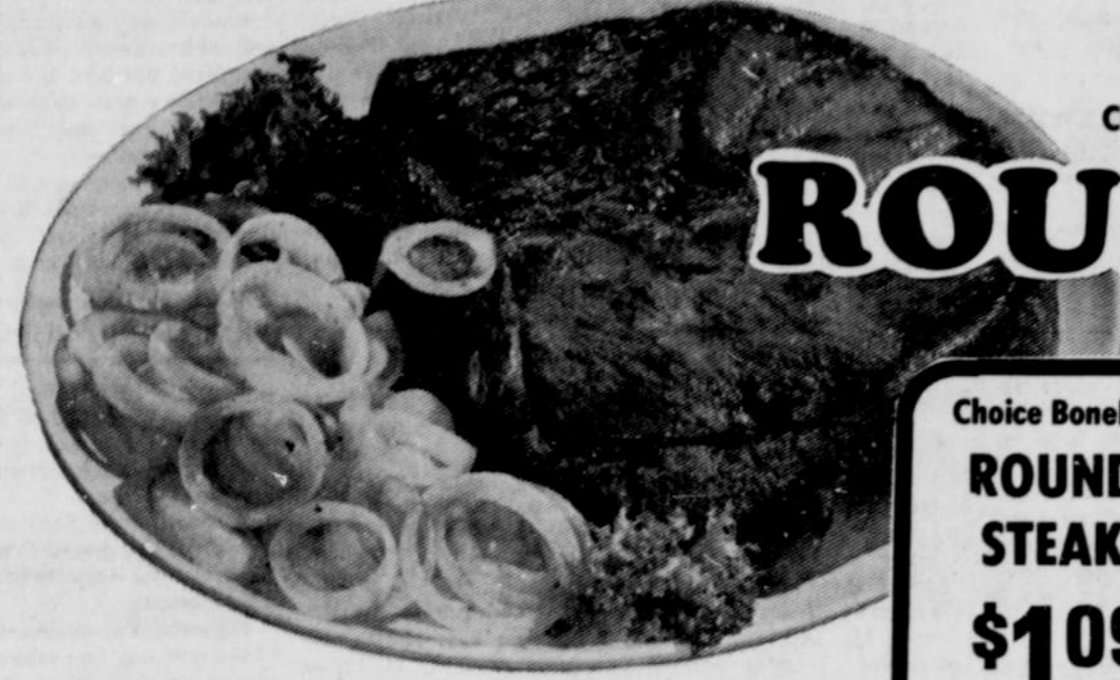
Your County Agent Says

Selection of replacement heifers in the spring is pretty much of a guessing game. The time to do it most accurately is in the fall when that heifer calf still shows the effect of plenty or lack of milk. If she shows her mother was a good milker, chances are she will be also. But if she's weaned and mixed with all the other calves that spring, she loses her identity and shows her wintering ability not the milkability of her mother. So - if weaning weights are important to you - select your heifer replacements in the fall. Keep them separate and manage for a 1000 lbs. two-year-old heifer to calve. Of course, culling prior to breeding based on ability to gain on your feed is important. So select enough heifer calf replacements to allow a 10-20% cull out of yearling time. Extra work? Sure! but your reward can be a really top producing cow herd in a relatively short time.

If you have trees that have been a problem, fall is the best time to kill those unwanted ones. Cut with a saw then treat the stump with 24 D ester and diesel oil, 1/2 and 1/2. This will kill the entire root system and prevent sprouting. Girdling of the tree does the job also but spray the exposed area with the 24 D - diesel mix for faster and more permanent results. If you have old roots that keep sending up shoots - dig down to the root, gash with an axe and pour in some of the 24 D - diesel mixture. It does the job.
