Five National Audubon Society Wildlife films will be presented at TVCC during the 1976-77 school year. Offered through the community education and science departments, the series is open to the public free of charge.

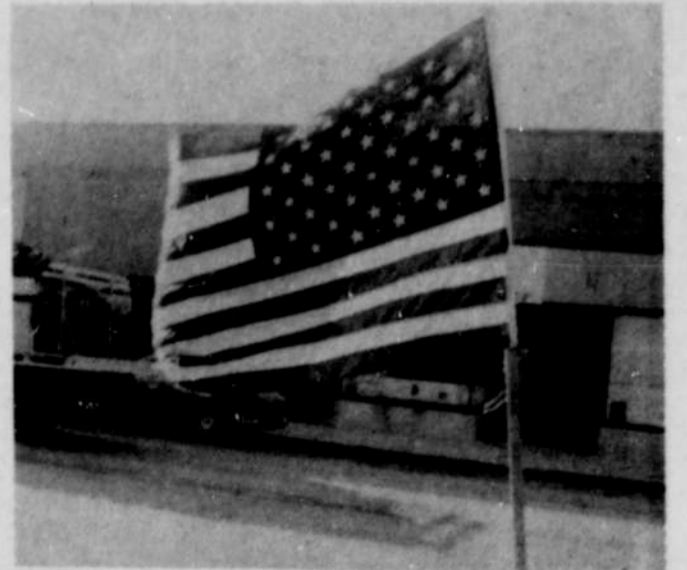

The narrator, Richard C. Kern, was one of ten men who purchased a 400 acre tract of land surrounding the creek. The group's main purpose, codified in an extensive legal agreement, is to preserve the land and its wildlife.

Other coming attractions include: "Twentieth Century Wilderness", "Bermuda - Land and Sea", "Outback Australia" and "West Side Story - Mexico to Alaska."
