Mrs. Oliver Freel spent Wednesday, Thursday and Friday with her daughter Sharon Binger and husband in Hepner.

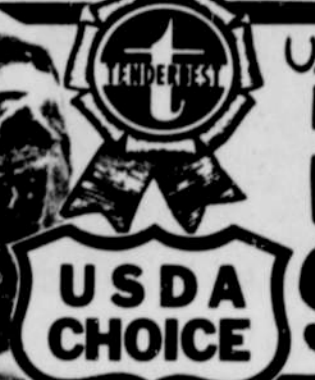
