Big Game Friday Night

Friday night is the big game with Vale. This game, as in the past, will fill the Nyssa stands with avid football fans on both sides of the field, and this game promises to be one of the best ever.

Vale is undefeated, both in league play and for the season, and they are the greater Oregon League champs, win or lose. Last year they went on to the State of Oregon championship in AA play, and they appear to be just as strong this year.

Nyssa doesn't have quite as good a record, with two losses in Greater Oregon League and four wins, but the Bulldogs have come on strong in the last few games and have displayed perhaps one of the most potent offenses in Nyssa football history.

One fact seems evident, and that is that the brand of athletics displayed in our district of the Greater Oregon League is exceptionally good. Nyssa lost a close game to Ontario in the first game of the season, with Coach Art Bullock experimenting with players in different positions to find out what all his players could do. Vale beat Ontario a week or so later. Ontario in turn has gone on to beat Pendleton, La Grande, Baker and other AAA teams in their league, and they are tied with Bend for the league lead.

We can be particularly proud of this year's team. Heavy losses by graduation left them pretty thin, and many of the players have had to go both ways. A strong junior varsity program helped train players to fill the gaps, and next year's team may well be even stronger. The junior varsity is undefeated!

The Vale-Nyssa rivalry is one of the best. The games played by these teams are always well-played, clean and hard-fought. Friday night we should see one of the best. Come early for a good seat, and support your team.

Artie Robertson

Services for Artie Robertson, 81, Nyssa, who died Tuesday, October 26, 1976 at Malheur Memorial Hospital were conducted Friday at the Lienkaemper Chapel, Nyssa, by the Rev. Letitia Croom, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Nyssa. Interment was in the Nyssa Cemetery.



He was born October 17, 1895, ten miles southwest of Nyssa, a son of Joseph W. and Sarah Pettet Robertson and lived here his entire life. He attended Owyhee grade school and Vale high school. He married Ida A. Ray in Vale in 1920.

He worked as a rural substitute carrier, general land surveyor and at Idanha Orchards, northwest of Nyssa. He received his appointment as regular rural Route 1 mail carrier on March 7, 1921. At that time Elizabeth Thompson was postmistress and he was the only other Nyssa postal employee. He retired July 31, 1962 after 41 years and five-months of service.

Mr. Robertson started carrying the mail in a Model T Ford. His first route was approximately 33 miles long with only about 200 yards of dirt roads. For approximately 30 years he delivered the mail to Adrian.

Artie loved this country and was an avid fisherman and hunter. He was a veteran of World War I.

Surviving are his wife Ida, Nyssa; a daughter Mrs. Richard (Carole) Kenny, Salem; a sister, Nellie Newbill, Nyssa; and four grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a son, Joseph in June 1961.

Memorials may be made to the Malheur Memorial Hospital, Nyssa.

George T. Wilson

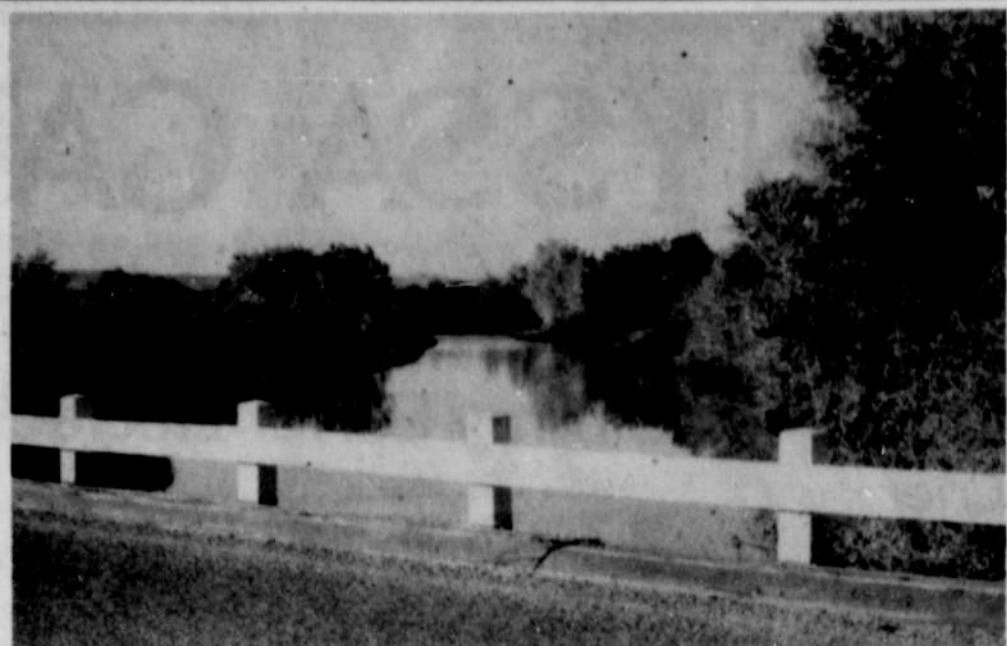
