



## OUT OF THE PAST

### 10 YEARS AGO

Laurel Beck, Nyssa high school's football homecoming queen, was among 17 area high school girls entered in Boise's 18th annual Fairland Parade Queen's contest.

One of Nyssa's old landmarks, a building one-half block long, was gutted by flames early last Thursday morning.

The structure extending from Good Avenue north, on the east side of South First Street is presently owned by Zigmunt Biokoiski and served as living quarters for families and individuals. The building was constructed many years ago and once housed some of the town's principal business firms.

### 20 YEARS AGO

Pfc. Dick W. Hart, son of Mr. and Mrs. Klaas Hart, Route 1, Nyssa, is a member of the 554th Anti-aircraft Artillery Missile Battalion at Fort MacArthur, California.

Assigned to the battalion's battery B, Hart completed basic training at Fort Carson, Colorado. He is a 1953 graduate of Nyssa High School.

Nyssa area men who left Saturday from Boise by plane for Ft. Ord, California, where they will receive training in the U.S. Army were Lewis Stam, Jerry Gordon, Roger Stephen and Glenn Marcum.

Grant Rinehart and Gus Liming are new city council members who will succeed Tom Jones and Hugh Tobler in January, and Paul House and Walker Low will succeed themselves on the council.

### 30 YEARS AGO

Nyssa is so overcrowded that people are living in all types of buildings in order to gain shelter, according to Grant Rinehart, who has just completed the annual school census.

The census figures gathered by Rinehart partially indicate the city is overcrowded. The population of the school district, including the city and rural area,

between the ages of 4 and 20 months amounts to 1,584, an increase of 299 during the last year. Superintendent Henry Hartley expressed the opinion that the greater part of the gain occurred in Nyssa.

The census last year showed that the Nyssa district population included 1185 youngsters between the ages of 4 and 20 and the Arcadia district 100 children of such age. With the Arcadia district which is now a part of the Nyssa district, the census shows 818 boys and 766 girls or a total of 1584. Hartley estimated that the increase represents a gain in families

between 100 and 150.

Rinehart found Nyssa residents living in basements and many types of buildings and persons in the rural areas living in barns and other out-buildings.

### 40 YEARS AGO

A meeting of the legal voters of District 39, which is the Oregon Trail District, will be held next Tuesday evening for the purpose of voting on the question of transporting children to and from school.

A movement has been started, principally from the new settlers who live some

distance from school, to have a school bus or some means of conveyance provided to transport the pupils. Voters eligible to vote on the question are those whose property has been assessed and recorded in the assessor's office regardless of whether any actual tax payments have been made to date. The district does not operate a school bus at present.

Local teachers have an interesting problem with the two younger children of Mr. and Mrs. Van Twist, who

recently came to Nyssa from Holland. While the elder Van Twist have lived here before, and can speak English, their two children cannot speak a word. They are seven years old and have been entered in the first grade of the local school.

The interesting problem is: How long will it take the youngsters to learn to speak the English language through the classroom and through contact with other children in their play. Teachers are hopeful that within a short time the youngsters will have an understanding of our language.

### 50 YEARS AGO

W. L. Lowe, trapper in the territory adjacent to Sunter, sold \$1,000 worth of coyote hides Tuesday to a representative of the Albany, Oregon Tanning Company. The sale brought Mr. Lowe's receipts from coyote hides this season to a total of \$2,400.

Mr. Lowe, as the result of ten years of trapping in Harney county, has received in excess of \$30,000 for coyote hides and, he said, expects this season will add \$3,000 or more to the total. —Burns News.
