Mrs. Alice Pulsipher called to say that she'd read the Sage last week where it told about the school for Indian children at Brigham City, and she thought folks would be interested to know that her husband, George Pulsipher, had helped to build those buildings in the first place.

She said that during World War I they were used as a stockade for prisoners. After that it was changed to an Indian School.

A landmark log cabin at Avon, near Brigham City, now fenced and viewed as a historical site, she said, by Mr. Pulsipher's father, the first log cabin there.

Mr. Pulsipher's father was also involved in the building of the Mormon Temple, she said. As a lumberman, he hauled in the logs for it, and he made the pegs that were used as nails in it. He had also used no nails in the cabin, she said, only handmade pegs.

Seems our former neighbor who passed on a few years ago, was the last of a pioneer family, and that his father's name is mentioned in the Mormon history books.
