However, Charley Ruh has recently found the skeletons of three buffalo in the bed of Malheur Lake, where the water has formerly receded and left hundreds of acres dry.

Capt. Louie, the old Piute Indian, tells of his father having witnessed a scene during his lifetime of a large herd of buffalo coming to the Harney Lake in the vicinity of

the OO Ranch when there had been a long drought, and how hundreds of them died there from thirst. Skeletons of buffalo have been unearthed in that vicinity, which confirms this story. Possibly the skeletons lately found by Charley Ruh were buffalo having either perished from thirst or possibly gone out on the ice in the winter and broken through.
