Friday night the Bulldogs ran away with the game in the first half, leading by 26-8 after the first quarter, and 41-25 at halftime. Ernie Delgado and Dirk Sappe were both hot, and their soft, high arching shots found the basket almost every time they shot. The two combined for 48 points in the game to lead the Nyssa scoring.

The third quarter saw the Bulldogs increase their lead to 57-35, and they coasted in for the easy victory as Coach Gerald Talbot used his whole squad. GU's Porter was hot in the last quarter, and ended with a gameleading 30 points.

Saturday night at Burns the Bulldogs were as cold as they were warm the night before, and were behind the whole game, with only the

first quarter being close. They trailed by four points at the quarter, fell further behind to 38-23 at halftime, and Burns held a 20-point lead throughout the rest of the ballgame.

Tax Information Out For Students

A new publication titled "The Tax Jungle Book" has been published by the Oregon Department of Revenue. It is part of a joint information program by the Department of Education and the revenue department and is aimed at Oregon's future taxpayers, revenue director John J. Lobdell announces.

The 20-page, cartoon-illustrated booklet covers basic tax theory and the structure of the Oregon tax system. While it is designed for use in high school classes in personal finance, citizenship, government, economics or consumer education, adults may find the easy-to-read material interesting and informative, Lobdell says.

Economic principles of taxation and the specifics of the Oregon income tax and the local property tax are explained in the booklet. It

includes a glossary of tax terms and a look at the state General Fund budget.

Lobdell believes every high school graduate should have a "mental tool kit" for evaluating news and proposals dealing with taxation. Informed citizens are imperative, if we are ever to address the real issues of tax reform, he says. This is especially true in Oregon, where the referendum and the six percent limitation give voters direct access to tax-related ballot measures.
