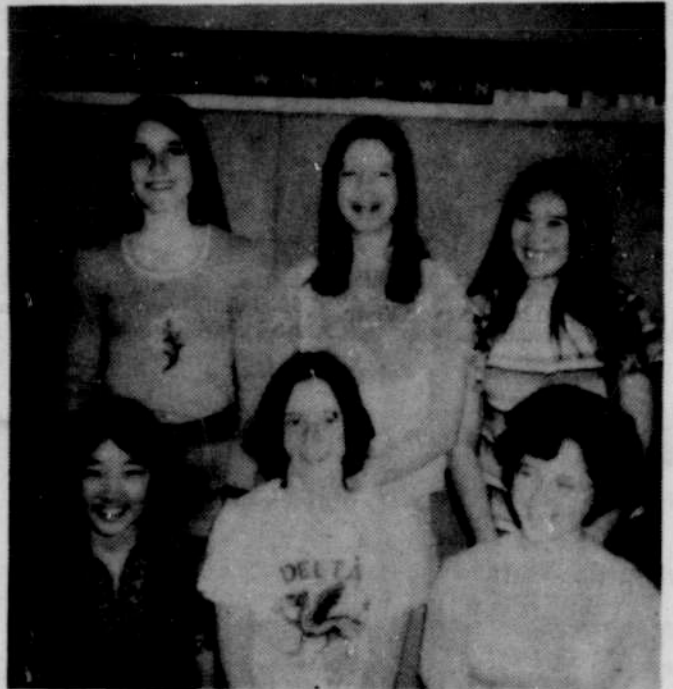
Mr. and Mrs. Escobedo were married in Piedras Negras, Coahuila, Mexico on January 20, 1952.

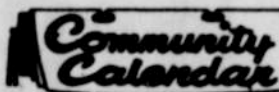
Meeting Stated

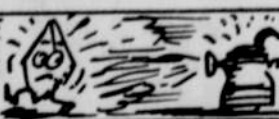

Emma Wimp celebrated her 92nd birthday at Malheur Memorial Nursing Home in Nyssa on Saturday, January 22, 1977. She is another senior citizen who very reluctantly gave up the active life, having maintained her own household with very little extra help during the years she lived alone, since her husband's death in 1942. That home was an acreage at the north end of Nyssa, where she and her family moved and settled in 1928.

For many of the recent years on her special day of January 22, her neighbors and many friends gathered around to make this a festive occasion. Quoting from a previous report on her 86th birthday in an issue of the Gate City Journal, "She is a person who just can't wait to get up every morning to do the many things she wants to do." These "things" included the outside work that was involved in the upkeep of her acreage, such as donning rubber boots at four o'clock in the morning to irrigate her pasture when the water was turned on for that week; and caring for her garden, flowers, fruit trees and berries.

The results of which she shared with everyone around her. Numerous hobbies such as stamp and coin collection, and the ever present handwork which she picked up the moment she sat down for awhile. The beautiful results of this needlework was

handed on to her family and other fortunate recipients.

Quilts were pieced during the winter months when she was "house bound," and over 300 pairs of pillow cases were embroidered by her busy hands. All of this activity did not prevent her from keeping abreast of all that was going on in the world around her, in civic, community and worldwide political life, being an extremely concerned person. One reward of this concern was the receiving of the flag of the United States which had flown over Washington D.C. on her 89th birthday and was then sent to her with a special message from Al Ullman.

Another reward of her married life was raising two daughters, Mrs. Bertha Williams of Moses Lake, Washington and Mrs. Jimmie Block of Chemult, Oregon. She also has four granddaughters and nine great-grandchildren.

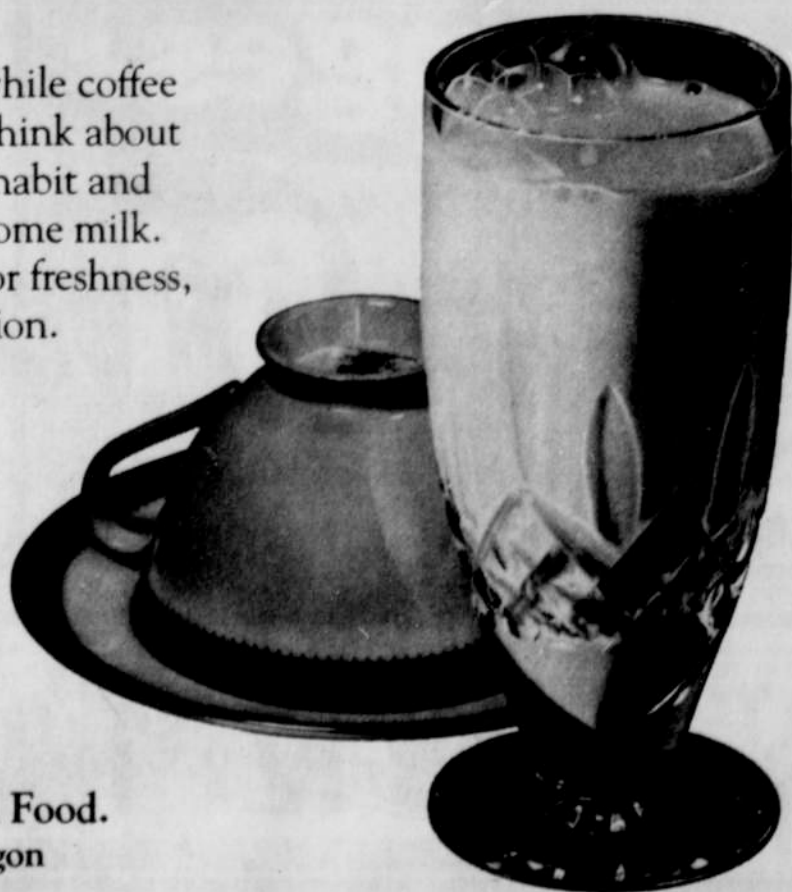
