10 YEARS AGO

20 YEARS AGO

30 YEARS AGO

Prospects that at least part of the Nyssa grade school pupils will be taught on a double-shift basis next year because of the shortage of school rooms were indicated at a meeting of the school board and planning committee Tuesday night with Dr. C.L. Huffaker, dean of education of the University of Oregon, who made a survey of the district this week.

Figures compiled by Dr. Huffaker revealed that the school attendance last year increased almost 10 percent over the attendance of the year before and attendance this year has increased 20 percent over that of last year.

"It would not be at all impossible that by this time next year you have as many in the first eight grades as you now have in 12 grades," Dr. Huffaker said.

Dr. Huffaker suggested that the school district could move one of the 17 sections in the Nyssa grade school to Arcadia, giving the district 20 sections (or rooms) in the two schools.

The six lower grades will probably have to be operated on a double-shift basis, the educator said. That means seven or eight additional teachers. Part of the children

would attend school in the morning and the remainder would attend in the afternoon. No relief from construction of a new building could be expected soon, as the work would require from 12 to 18 months.

40 YEARS AGO

The Amalgamated Sugar Company entered the Nyssa territory Wednesday in a substantial way with the purchase of the 185 acre E.N. Greig ranch directly east of Nyssa at a reputed price of \$15,000 cash. The Hansen 10 acres, which joins the Greig ranch on the south and is bounded by the Snake River, was also purchased by the sugar manufacturing company.

The company will start immediate construction of a warehouse, approximately 40 x 100 feet to house the district offices of the company and storage space for machinery, seed and other equipment. All the clerical work for the district from Weiser to Caldwell will be handled from the Nyssa office. The warehouse will be built in the northwest corner of the company's newly acquired land, close to the highway. The company will likely construct a sugar factory at a later date if present plans materialize.

Farmers and businessmen are enthusiastic over the company's decision to make Nyssa their base of operations and many farmers who have hesitated about signing for an acreage of beets are expected to "play ball with the sugar company" by growing the beets they desire.

These lands are settling fast with a very desirable type of settler and there is strong proof to back up the prediction of several experienced men that Nyssa, in a comparatively short time, will become the "Sugar Bowl" of the United States.

60 YEARS AGO

The farm residence of Fred Woods was totally destroyed by fire Monday morning, together with its contents, the family barely escaping with their lives.

The fire occurred in the early morning and started from a kettle of oil Mr. Woods was heating catching fire and exploding. Mr. Woods was burned while attempting to get back into the house to get the children. Mrs. Woods lowered two younger children to safety through a window in their night clothes.

Medicare Insurance Sign-up March 31

People who didn't sign up for Medicare medical insurance when they first became eligible or who have cancelled the protection once can enroll now through March 31 at any social security office, according to Robert R. Peckham, social security branch manager in Ontario.

Medicare medical insurance is offered automatically to people who reach 65 and are eligible for social security benefits—and to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to monthly social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more. Nine out of ten people eligible are enrolled in the program, according to Mr. Peckham.

People who have worked long enough under social security or the railroad retirement system can get Medicare if they have per-

manent kidney failure. Their wives or husbands or children may also be eligible for Medicare if they have permanent kidney failure.

Medicare is administered by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The Ontario social security office is at 2024 SW 4th Avenue, Ontario, Oregon. The phone number is 889-3146.

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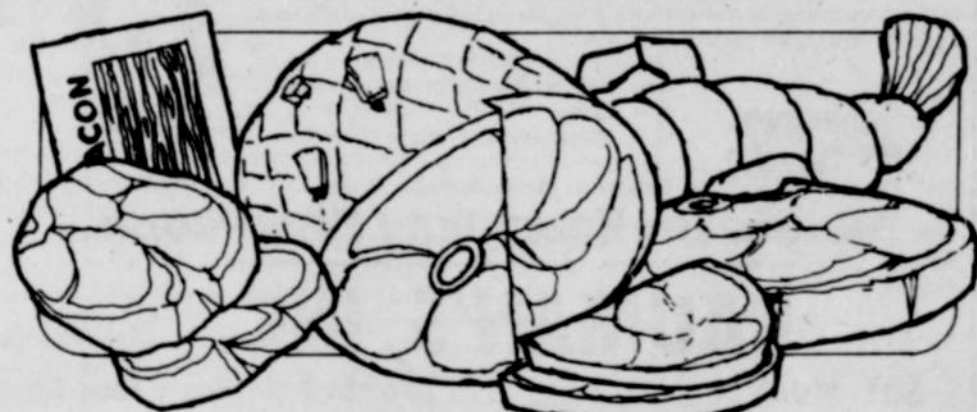
