Mother's Early Day Struggle In Business World

Mrs. Emma Wimp struck out from the hide-bound customs of her day for the liberation of women almost 75 years ago.

As Emma Nemitz, she took the county proficiency test for a teacher's certificate right after finishing the 8th grade. She passed with very high grades, a test some college students would have difficulty with today, and started teaching a country school. Some of her pupils were big, strapping boys, older than she was. Not that she wanted to teach, but it was the only profession a girl of her day could enter while waiting to get married and settle down. Girls who were brazen enough to enter the business world were not well thought of and it lessened their prospects of ever getting married. What man would want to take a chance with a woman who worked in the company of other men?

Miss Nemitz taught two terms in schools in Iowa and Missouri before she had courage enough to defy her father's wishes and enter the Drake Business College in Burlington, Iowa. She had received \$30 per month plus room and board during her teaching jobs, and had very little resources to draw from while attending business school. She often must go hungry in her effort to establish her independence. She earned a little extra money working part time correcting papers.

After graduating from business college, she went to work as bookkeeper for the Drake Hardware Company, remaining in this position for over ten years. She did conform to some of the customs of that day, namely, that she would become an old maid if unwed at the age of 30. So, two months before that birthday arrived, she was married to Adrian Wimp in 1914. He had been waiting in the wings and had proposed countless times over a 15-year period.

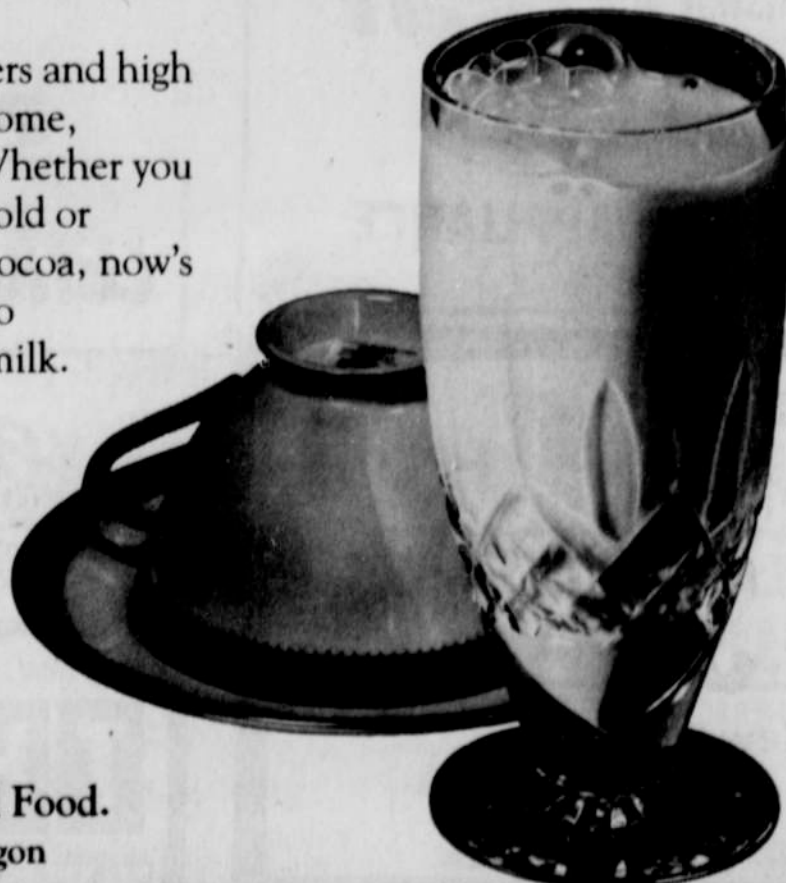
