The Portland Rose, crack Union Pacific flyer, was delayed in Nyssa Wednesday evening for nearly an hour, due to a unique mishap. When the big engine pulled into Nyssa, Operator Woodruff noticed sparks flying from one of the wheels under the engine tender. Investigation showed that a casting had broken and a big piece of iron wedged between one of the wheels and the frame.

A crew of workmen set to work at top speed, and the piece of iron proved stubborn. The wheels were jacked up, but in spite of every trick known to the crew, they were

unable to remove the obstruction. The engine and cars used on the Homedale branch was standing on a sidetrack waiting for the Rose to pass, but when the big engine was disabled; the smaller engine was pressed into duty. The comparatively small Homedale engine grunted and groaned but finally got the long train underway and pulled it to Huntington where a new engine sped the Rose on its way.

David Yount, a career missionary in the Philippines with the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society of Wheaton, Illinois, will tell of his work with Baptist churches when he speaks at the Conservative Baptist Church Sunday February 20 at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. and February 21-23 at 7:30 p.m.

Yount graduated from the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago, Illinois and from the Conservative Baptist Theological Seminary, Denver, Colorado. He and his wife were appointed to career missionary service with CB-FMS in 1967.
