The Past Presidents of the American Legion met Monday, February 7 at the home of Mrs. A. L. Heldt. The eight members present made

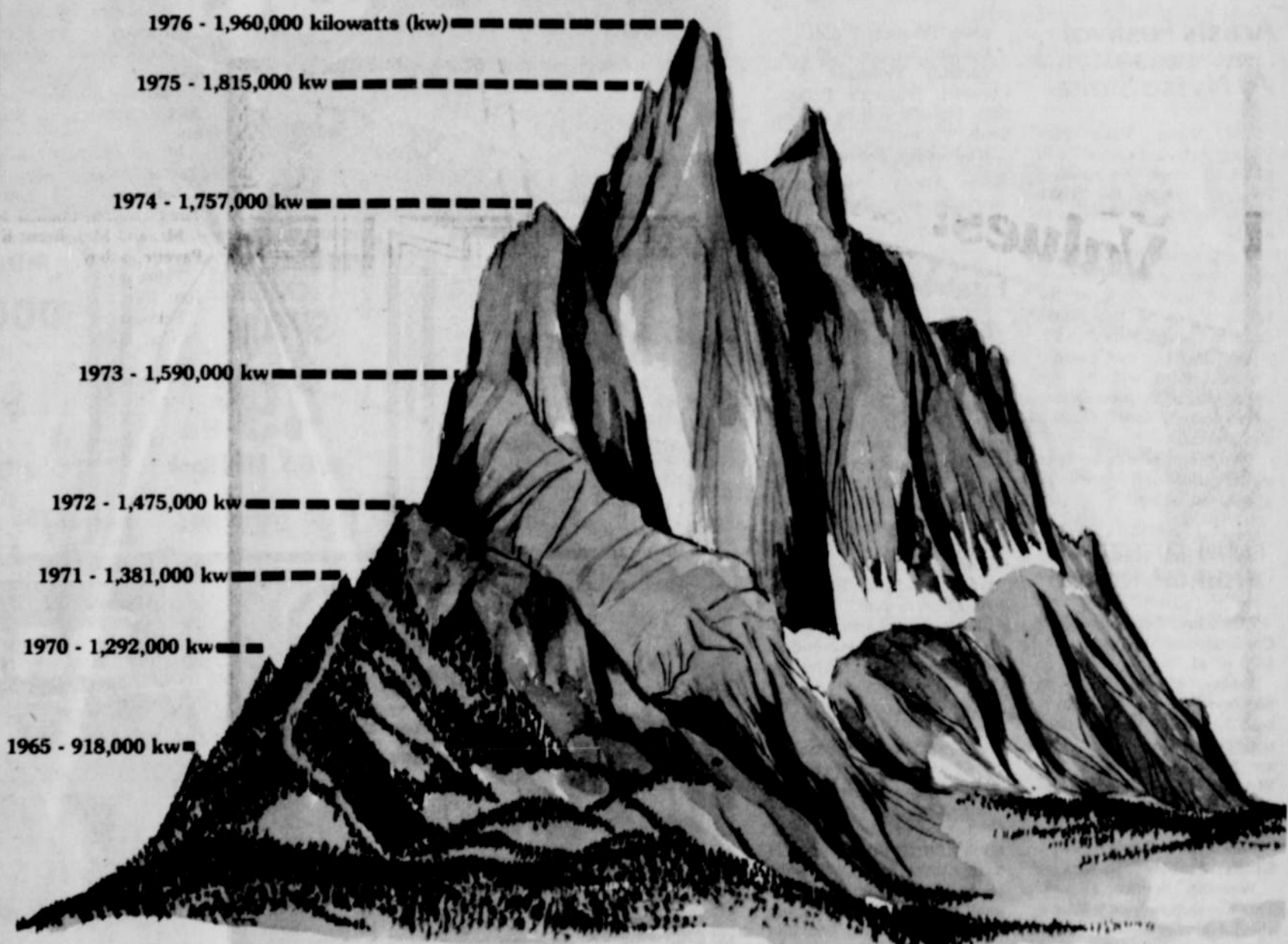
66 colorful paper flowers for the Veteran's Wheelchair Parade in Portland. Refreshments were served.

Our peak gets bigger every year.

On June 30, 1976, you and your neighbors set a record. You collectively used more electricity than you ever had before.

Even with those resources, we were hard pressed

to meet all your needs for electricity on many of last summer's hottest days.

By the middle of July, river levels had dropped sharply, reducing our hydro capacity. Our hydro plants were producing only a third of your electricity. Imported power from other utilities was providing another third. The rest came mostly from coal at Jim Bridger.

Our 1976 peak was 145,000 kilowatts greater than our 1975 peak — an increase of 8 percent and a growth in your electric demand slightly higher than we had expected.

We're intent on providing you reliable and adequate electric service. And we'll do so if we can comply with all the environmental and regulatory requirements in time to construct new generating facilities to meet your growing needs.
