



OUT OF THE PAST

10 YEARS AGO

In the regular monthly meeting Tuesday night the Nyssa City Council took steps to start collecting \$18,000 past due from property owners in two improvement districts. Also refused to act on a proposal to change the name of Main Street to Thunderegg Boulevard.

The proposal for the latter was presented by Harold Brendle representing the Chamber of Commerce who approved the move by an 8-7 vote about two weeks ago.

The council members said it was not their "prerogative" to act on the matter as it

affected the entire town. They suggested that Brendle and others interested, present it by petition for placing on a city-wide ballot.

20 YEARS AGO

The Nyssa factory of Amalgamated Sugar Company established two new all-time production records when it wound up its 1956-57 beet slicing operations yesterday. Manager Jed Lewis reported.

The factory processed the largest tonnage of beets ever to go through the giant Nyssa factory in one season—more than 550,000 tons—and will produce more than 150 million pounds of its famed White Satin sugar.

Credit for the new production records, Lewis pointed

out, goes not only to the sugar factory and its crews, but also to the farmers of this area for their record high yield of beets per acre.

30 YEARS AGO

The Malheur Memorial Hospital fund has been increased by \$884.50 which was recently collected in the Adrian community by George Scheimer and Carl Hill.

The money, collected in the Adrian district west of the highway, has been turned over to the hospital association secretary.

The hospital association is still accepting donations, which have climbed to well over the \$30,000 mark. The drive is expected to be completed in time to take advantage of, by the legislature providing for means of securing government aid for the project.

40 YEARS AGO

Water started pouring through the needle valve at the Owyhee Dam, Wednesday as the bureau of reclamation started releasing water from the dam. Some 500 feet per second are being released at the present time in anticipation of a heavy spring run-off.

The storage level had reached 635,000 feet, and lacked 85,000 of being filled to capacity when it was decided to release some of the water.

The ring-gate spillway is so designed it can take care of practically any size run-off and no fears are held in this respect. The object of releasing the water in small quantities now is to get away from doing any damage to roads or farms below the dam when the heavy run-off starts. Heavy snow on the Owyhee watershed is expected to fill the dam to capacity again this year.

60 YEARS AGO

A mass meeting of the voters of Nyssa was held in the opera house Monday evening for the purpose of

nominating city officials to serve for the ensuing year. A representative gathering of citizens was present with Mayor S.D. Goshert in the chair.

The following nominations were made:

For mayor - S. F. Foster, C. C. Wilson and J. Boydell. For recorder - Roy Cook, W. B. Hoxie, A. H. Boydell. For treasurer - E. B. Nedry and W.W. Foster.

For councilmen - Jess Thompson, S. D. Goshert, Frank Leuck, F. O. Carman, Barney Wilson, A. Hinsch, H. Burbidge, George Green and George Phillips.

Mr. Hinsch has since announced that he positively declines the nomination and wished to be eliminated from the contest.

Friends of J. Boydell have petitioned that his name be

placed on the ballot as a candidate for recorder, the office he has filled the past two years to the satisfaction of the electorate. This will leave the majority track clear from Mr. Wilson and Mr. Foster.
