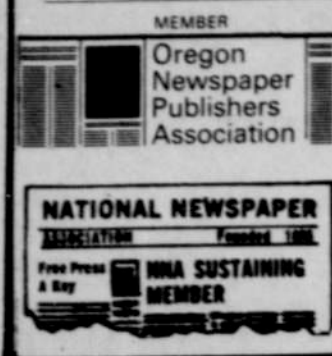

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Unethical Ethics Bill

On February 20, a pay increase went into effect for all Members of Congress—I opposed that measure. Then following the Mary Poppins rule that a ".....spoon full of sugar makes the medicine go down," the Congress then prepared a political package called the Financial Ethics Bill which overwhelmingly passed in an effort to calm down the widespread and justified cries of outrage against the federal pay raise.

I supported the financial disclosure portion of the bill and I have always made my financial records available for public inspection at any time since first being elected.

I opposed the so-called Financial Ethics bill because it not only makes way for another \$5,000 plunge into the taxpayers already parched reservoir; but in addition places strict limitations on Members who have ability but not residual wealth.

Congressman Barry Goldwater, Jr., (R-Calif.) outlines below some of the reasons this bill is political propaganda rather than any real commitment to ethics:

(1) "Under this bill, only the rich are ethical; investment income is ethical and allowed, but earned income is not ethical, and not allowed. A Member who earns \$100,000 a year from investments is ethical, but a Member who brings in \$10,000 by doing legal work or giving a speech or spending personal time working at a private business or trade is unethical;

(2) "If a Member owns the controlling interest in a business, it's possible for him to continue operating that business and be ethical. However, if he owns 49% or less of the business, he would be unethical;

(3) "If it's the Member's family who owns the interest, he can continue as he has and be ethical; for instance, if this bill was applied to Senator Edward Kennedy, or Senator John Heinz, they would be ethical. But Congressman Larry McDonald, who is a physician, would be considered unethical if he practiced medicine for a fee on the weekends;

(4) "If a Member receives royalties for writing a book, he's ethical, but if he accepts a fee for writing those words in an article or speaking them at a lecture, he is unethical. Should this provision be applied to former President Nixon and his book, he would be ethical; applied to the late Winston Churchill, should he have sold one of his paintings, would have branded him unethical."

4-H Projects For Young People

Young people who like the look and feel of hand knitted or crocheted fashion accessories or garments can learn how through the 4-H crocheting and knitting projects, says Carol Knothe, Malheur County Extension Agent.

Both projects let young people learn at their own pace and both can continue over a period of years or last just a few months, depending upon the interest of both young people and the adult volunteer leader, Mrs. Knothe adds.

The 4-H knitting project is divided into seven phases, each phase somewhat more difficult than the preceding one, explains Barbara Sawyer, Oregon State University Extension 4-H and youth specialist.

Although most 4-H members take a year to complete each phase, it is possible to move through more than one phase in a year, she notes.

Crocheting is in its second year as a state-wide project, the specialist points out. It is divided into six phases.

Both projects give the leader and 4-H members a great deal of flexibility regarding club activities and the final product that the 4-H'ers wish to make, Mrs. Knothe points out.

Additional information about the 4-H knitting and crocheting projects, which are available to young people in grades four through twelve, is available from the Malheur County Extension Office in Ontario.
