10 YEARS AGO

The Journal owners anticipate a big change in the operation of the local publication next week. If present plans develop, the next edition will be printed offset instead of letter press.

Possibly the average reader won't understand the use of the above terms, and the

publishers know that they are unaware of the problems faced in the changeover. But, trying to explain briefly what is occurring, the new process will be photographic instead of pressure from pre-inked rollers being used to pressure paper on typed forms set on indented metal.

The latter is now done on metal set on a line-casting machine with letters at the

top of the forms. Previously this was done on type that was hand-set, and just when the 60 year old local paper progressed to the machine method, is not known.

20 YEARS AGO

Final estimate of damage to Malheur County public works by the Vale flood February 24 amounts to \$325,883, County Judge G. Y. Chester announced Wednesday. He said that he understands \$300,000 will be approved by congress for disaster relief and anticipates 75 percent of that amount will actually be received for all purposes.

After a winter layoff the crews of the Hansen and Farr

construction Company of Spokane are back on the job and the construction of the new bridge across the Snake River has been resumed.

Wednesday afternoon workers were floating the barges necessary for mid-river work.

The Journal was given to understand that steel for the bridge is enroute from Portland. The company intends to start spanning the river from the Idaho side. The steel will be shipped to Parma and trucked back to the Idaho side of the river.

A recommendation that the school district add four classrooms and repair the present elementary school building

and improve the Oregon Trail building for uses of classes next fall was approved at a meeting of the Nyssa school building committee Tuesday night.

The committee includes members of the school board, who asked for the appointment of the committee to assist in the formulation of plans of additional school buildings, necessitated by the crowded conditions caused by the increase in local population.

R.N. Vanaller, who lives on Succor Creek near Jordan Valley, recently brought in

some coal samples taken from a mine on his property. The coal is in two veins which will soon run together. They are about 10 inches thick. The tunnel is in about 16 feet. The coal burns well and has the appearance of first class product.

Indications of valuable coal deposits have been noticed in various places along Succor Creek for years. Many pieces have been picked and burned, but as most of the coal beds lie so near the water, no one has ever tried to develop a mine.

Years ago in Coal Mine basin a shaft was sunk and a fairly good quality of coal was dug out. Several freight loads were hauled to Caldwell but the water raised in the shaft and the work stopped. A few

years ago another mine was opened in Texas basin and several loads were sold, but lack of capital to develop this mine resulted in abandonment.

These coal indications are located quite close together. In time rich mines may develop.
