Completes Training



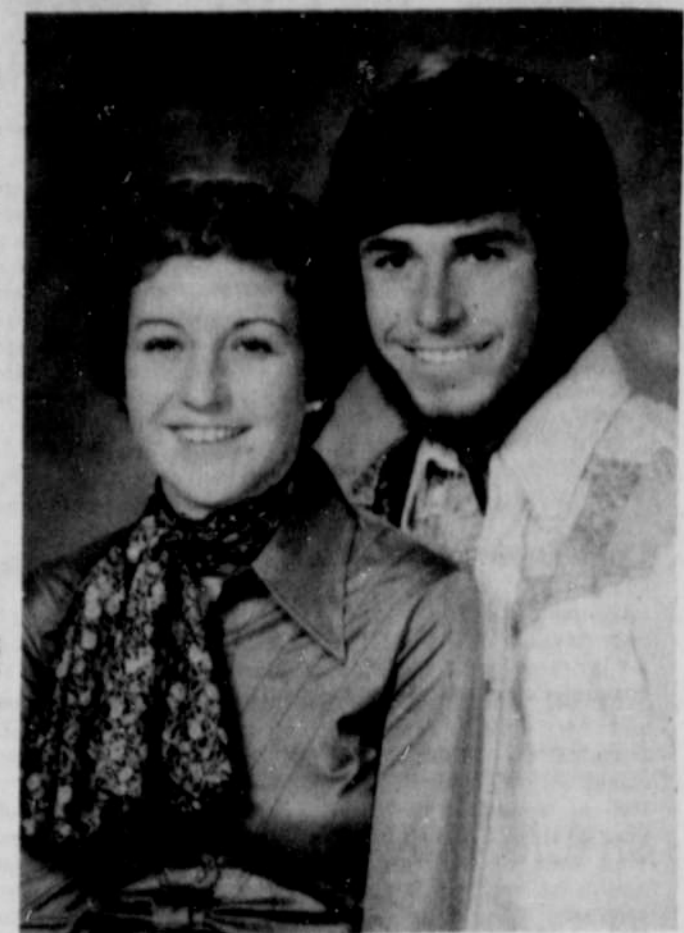
Judy Peterson-Nedry
