10 YEARS AGO

About 2700 feet of road from Owyhee Dam for the connection with Gordon Gulch has been completed while the remainder can be built with a minimum of blasting, according to Ken Renstrom.

The new road was described as two-way with a minimum of 25 feet wide and as much as 40 feet wide in most open areas. The road is a water grade to allow all vehicles to travel in high gear.

Part of the road can now be traveled by vehicles using Tunnel Canyon through Adrian and even some passenger cars have gone through, although that is not advised at the present time.

GETTING RID OF CLUTTER
