

Applications Sought For Summer Jobs

Applications for short term summer employment in two Oregon State University Extension Service Youth Programs are now being accepted according to Marilyn Mohr, Malheur County Extension Agent.

Some 35 students who have completed at least one year of college or who are 19 years or older, are being sought to serve as counselors during 4-H Summer Week on the OSU campus, June 13 - 18.

Another 12 young people who have finished one year of college or who are 19 and older, will be selected to work on the 4-H student staff at the Oregon State Fair in Salem, August 22 - September 6.

Deadline for applying for both programs is April 15, Miss Mohr notes. Application forms are available from the County Extension Office or from the State 4-H Office, Extension Hall 101, OSU, Corvallis, Oregon 97331.

Summer Week counselors will live in OSU residence halls and will work with about 30 junior high and high school age 4-H members each. Preference will be given to former 4-H members. Previous counseling experience is desirable, but not essential. Those selected will receive \$70.00 plus room and board.

The State Fair student staff assists with displays and exhibits at the fair and will work with younger 4-H members in conducting various events and activities during the State Show. Those selected will receive \$23.00 a day plus lodging in the State Fair dormitory. Preference will be given to former 4-H members who have participated in State Fair.

Old Theme, New Twist

Traditionally, January is budget month with homemakers searching for new ways to stretch the food dollar after the holiday season.

What better way to start the new year than with everybody's favorite, beef and potatoes. This team can be super thrifty or downright elegant, depending on the occasion and budget. There's the tried and true steak and baked potato or hamburger and fries.

For the budget-minded, a little imagination and ground beef yields Salisbury Steak Special with Mashed Potato Salad. Ground beef, combined with mushrooms, chives and sour cream, makes Salisbury steaks that rate special menu billing. A tangy topping of catsup and horseradish completes these gourmet beef patties. And, what better way to use leftover mashed potatoes than in Potato Salad served in tomato flowers.

Salisbury Steak Special

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 3/4 cup bread crumbs
- 1 can (4 ounces) mushroom stems and pieces, drained and chopped
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons snipped parsley
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- Tangy Topping*

Lightly mix ground beef, sour cream, bread crumbs, mushrooms, onion, parsley, salt and pepper and shape into 6 oval patties, 1 inch thick. Place patties on rack in broiler pan so surface of meat is 3 to 4 inches from heat. Broil 8 to 10 minutes on one side. Turn and continue broiling 7 to 12 minutes, depending on doneness desired. Spoon Tangy Topping on each patty. 6 servings.

Tangy Topping

- 1/2 cup catsup
 - 1 to 2 teaspoons prepared horseradish
 - 3/4 teaspoon chives
- Combine catsup and horseradish and top each patty with one tablespoon mixture. Sprinkle each with 1/8 teaspoon chives.

Mashed Potato Salad in Tomato Flowers

- 3 cups mashed potatoes
 - 1/2 cup mayonnaise
 - 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
 - 1/4 cup chopped pickle
 - 1/4 cup chopped onion
 - 1 tablespoon chopped pimiento
 - 1 to 2 tablespoons vinegar
 - Tomato Flowers
- Stir mayonnaise, eggs, pickle, onion, pimiento and vinegar together with mashed potatoes. Cover and chill at least 2 hours. Spoon into Tomato Flowers. 4 to 6 servings.

Tomato Flowers:

Cut off the stem ends of 4 medium tomatoes, washed and chilled. With cut side down, cut each tomato into fourths, cutting through to within 1 inch of the bottom. Carefully spread out sections, forming a "flower."

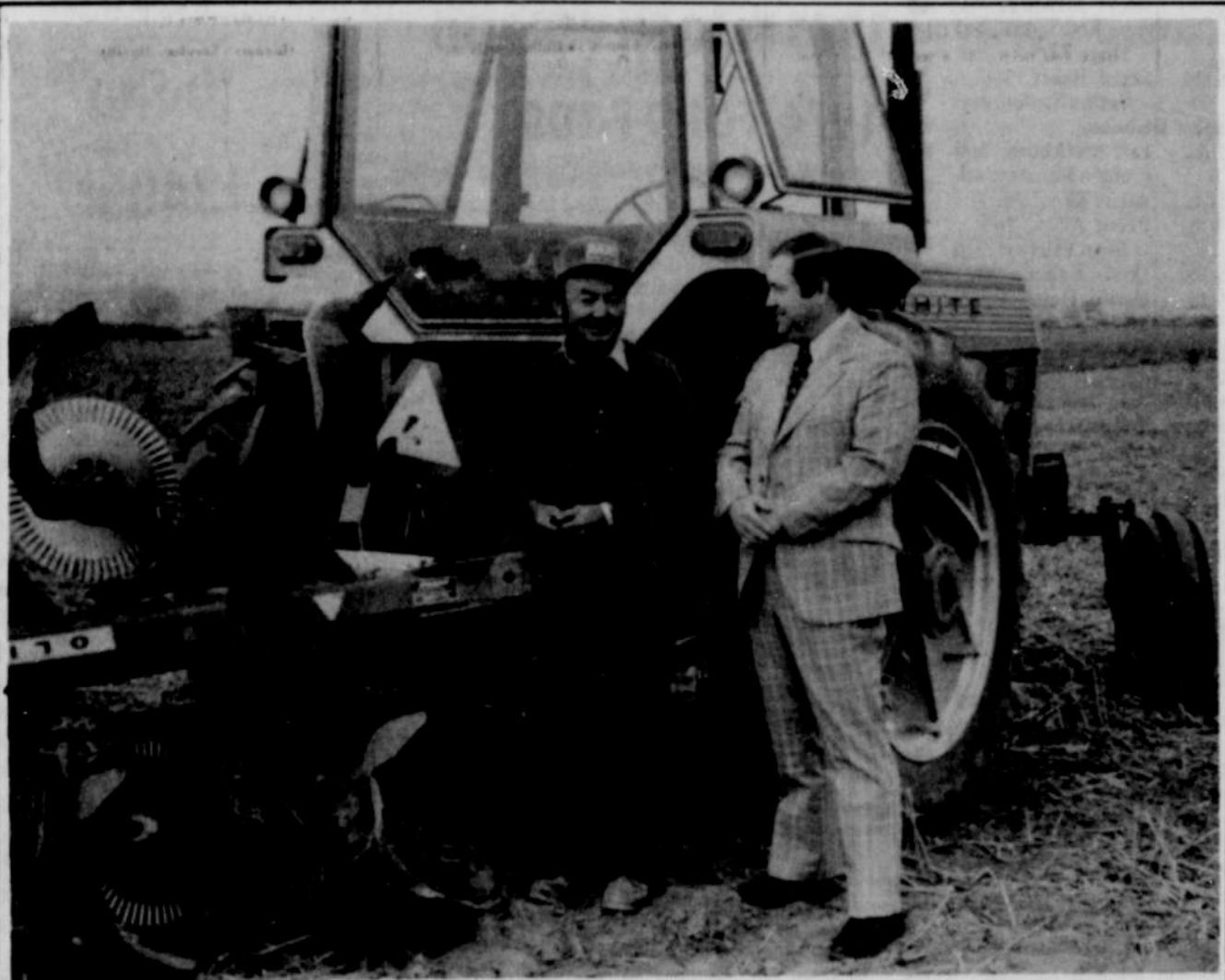
