The Journal was purchased from Klass Powell by Duane Alters and the late George Whorton April 1, 1952 and Alters has been editor and publisher since that time.

Salad Turned Into Eve's Delight



Since time eternal, apples have been a tempting fruit, and this Stuffed Apple Salad is an inviting change from the usual lunch box fare. For safe keeping, pack it in an insulated container.

CHICKEN SALAD STUFFED APPLE

- 2 large red eating apples
 - 2 teaspoons lemon juice
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped cooked chicken
 - 1/4 cup Hellmann's/Best Foods real mayonnaise
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper or celery
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/8 teaspoon celery seed
- Cut 1-inch slice from top of apple. Using small sharp knife, make 1/2-inch v-shape cuts around apple. With knife, carefully hollow out apple leaving 1/2-inch pulp intact. Discarding core, finely chop pieces with lemon peel for second apple. Sprinkle cut edges with lemon juice. In small bowl, stir together chopped apple, chicken, real mayonnaise, green pepper, salt and celery seed. Firmly press filling into each apple cavity. Top with apple caps. Wrap in plastic wrap and chill until lunch bags are packed. Makes 2.
