CINNAMON BROWNIES

- 3/4 cup butter or margarine
- 4 squares (1 oz. each) unsweetened chocolate
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1-1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon grated orange peel
- 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts

In a medium saucepan melt butter and chocolate over very low heat. Remove from heat; stir in sugar and eggs; set aside. In a medium bowl combine flour, cinnamon, baking powder, salt and orange peel. Stir into chocolate mixture just until smooth and well blended. Stir in nuts. Spread in a greased 13x9x2-inch baking pan. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350°F.) until mixture starts to come away from sides of pan, about 30 minutes. Cool slightly on a wire rack. Cut into squares; remove from pan and cool completely. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar, if desired. Yield: About 30 brownies.

Luxuriant Lawns



BRINGING UP YOUNG LAWNS. Here's how to improve the soil for new lawns. Prepare a mixture of one part peat moss and one part horticultural perlite, a white, sterile lightweight volcanic material readily available at nursery centers in large packages for lawn application. Spread this mixture over the soil to a thickness of two to three inches. Rototill or spade the mixture into the soil, rake level and plant your seed. Water the soil area well to settle soil evenly.



MAINTAINING MATURE LAWNS. For a lawn that looks like a championship golf course, renovate where surface crusting has developed. Improvement in water penetration and aeration is obtained by spiking or aerifying the turf, spreading 1/4 inch of horticultural perlite and watering. Fertilizer should be applied at this stage. It is good practice to repeat this procedure in 4 to 5 months.

Alcoholism: A Public Responsibility.

Everyone knows an alcoholic: a friend, a neighbor, someone with whom you work, or do business, or play; a relative, maybe a member of the family. The staggering fact is that there are some nine million alcoholics, or problem drinkers in the United States today, with thousands of ex-dopers now using alcohol because of bad trips and harsh treatment associated with other mind-altering chemicals.

It is known additionally that the sickness of the alcoholic affects at least five other persons with whom he is associated: family, relatives, employers. That's 45 million concerned people.

Doctors, psychiatrists, and the clergy are quick to agree that the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous has been more successful in the treatment and rehabilitation of alcoholics than the sum of their best efforts combined.

Yet, the standing membership of AA includes only 750,000 recovering drunks meeting daily in 27,000 groups around the world, which is less than seven percent of the whole number. What then happens to the bulk of the uncontrolled drinking population?

You see and hear of them every day of your life: On the job, in their homes, on the town, in the daily news of record, in the offices of physicians and psychiatrists, in drying out drunk farms, divorce courts, police courts, hospitals, and those few publicly exposed winos in the skidrow section of any town of any size. Actually, less than six percent of the alcoholic population can be included in the visible, day-by-day partakers of the wrath of grapes.

The reference here is to Mr. and Mrs. Middle-Class America. If a cross-section of AA members will do for comparison, I speak of Catholic, Protestant, Jew, agnostic, and atheist; of

salesmen, teachers, attorneys, Congressmen, physicians, priests and ministers, judges, law enforcement persons, psychiatrists, news media and advertising people from publisher to copy boy; stage and screen and TV personalities by the score, all kinds of executives, bankers, secretaries, businessmen, career women, housewives, students, teenage-dropouts, all kinds of working stiff like myself, and members of the armed services from top brass to lowly boot.

Alcoholism is the great leveler, respecting no race, religious denomination, or age group; includes the wealthy and not-so-wealthy, the learned and the simple, male and female.

Alcoholism is a bona fide sickness of mind, body and spirit, recognized as such by the American Medical Association, American Psychiatric Association and all Christian churches worthy of the name.

Alcoholism is a public health problem, and therefore a public responsibility. Any lasting answers must come through information and education of the alcoholic, general public, the teaching and medical professions.

At this point in time, there is no one person, no group of persons, who can be thought of as knowing the whole problem, or solution for those addicted to the abuse of alcoholic beverages. Agent Says

A thought on water conservation: In a recent article published in Oregon's Environment, February issue, it was noted that the individual Oregonian uses more water flushing the toilet than any other household use. This is followed by bathing. These two items alone account for 60% of the household water use. If care is taken by using less water in the tub for tub baths and cut down on shower time, plus using a lower level in your toilet flush tank, substantial water savings can be made in the household.

Further water savings tips are suggested by Duane Hatch, OSU Extension Home Gardening Co-ordinator, according to Jim Burr, Malheur County Extension Agent

1. Don't use mounds or hills (i.e., a raise soil level with a rounded top) because water penetration is almost nil. Flat soil is better, and a basin or depression around plants such as cucumbers and squash will catch the water and give better results.
2. In the cool, early part of the growing season, use a plastic mulch around tomatoes, cucumbers, melons, peppers, and other warm season plants. Plastic will

Senior Apartments
Nears Completion

Twenty apartment units now under construction in the 500 block of South 5th Street will be ready for occupancy in April, according to Rockwood Development Corporation President, Jack M. Miller.

The project, known as Nyssa Manor, is financed by the Farm Home Administration (FmHA), and is designed to provide a non-institutional, residential environment for elderly residents, aged 62 or older.

The soon to be completed apartments are arranged in ground level four- and six-plexes around a central clubhouse facility containing of-

fice, laundry, and a recreational room. Off street parking for each resident is provided.

In those apartments designed to accommodate residents with wheelchairs, access is by ramp rather than steps, shelved pantries have been substituted for overhead kitchen cabinets, and bathrooms permit wheelchair maneuvering.

warm the soil in addition to conserving water. Later in the season use an organic mulch, such as straw or grass, to save water and keep down weeds.

3. Practice better-than-usual weed control. Weeds steal valuable moisture that vegetables could use.

4. Investigate trickle irrigation systems. These along-the-row plastic ooze-type systems can save half to two-thirds of the water usually

applied to the garden. They put the water right along the row and allow a minimum of evaporation.

In addition, they do not wet the foliage, thereby lessening the risk of disease. And they do not water the weeds between the rows.

"The only drawback to trickle irrigation is the expense," says Hatch. "But using it will pay off over a period of time."
