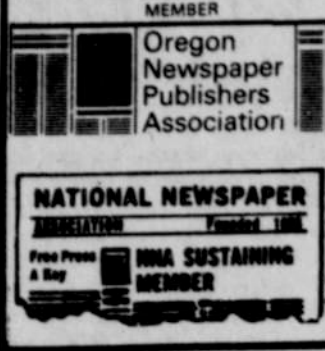

SAFE.....AND HAZARDOUS JOBS FOR KIDS

Almost every summer a child loses a life or a limb because a child labor law was ignored. Oregon's Commissioner of Labor wants to prevent another tragic story by making parents and employers aware of hazardous work for children. Child labor laws were the natural reaction to accidents according to Bill Stevenson. He uses real-life examples to tell employers and parents what can happen when these laws are ignored.

"Several years ago two boys, ages 12 and 13, irrigated on a farm near Albany. To get from field to field, the 13 year old drove a tractor while the 12 year old rode on the fender. One day there was a small stump in their path. It was not large enough to stop the tractor, but it jolted the unsuspecting 12 year old off his seat. As he fell, his jacket caught on a tire cleat and pulled him under the moving tracks. He was dead in seconds.

Almost every year, adults are killed by tractors. For children, the exhilaration of controlling a power-driven machine can be lethal. The Commissioner encourages employers who hire minors to give proper safety instructions and keep children within the sight of a supervising adult.

Electricity is another common cause of death. During a recent summer a child was moving irrigation pipes and accidentally touched a power line. The wet ground ensured instant death. Another youth worked as a pond-monkey near Tillamook. As he walked from log to log, he used an aluminum pole to feed logs to the sawmill pick-up chain. Preoccupied, he didn't notice a low-hanging power-line. He fell into the pond, electrocuted, when his pole grazed the wire. Neither child had been given safety instructions on how to work with poles above shoulder height.

In the Portland area a young girl went to work for a meat supplier. Her job was simple. Push the meat grinder switch marked 'on' and drop meat into it. Within 15 minutes she lost a hand.

In Eugene another minor moved a stack of pallets with a lift-truck. No one told him that you must keep your load close to the floor when turning. He loaded up, moved down one aisle, started turning and was crushed to death when the life overturned.

These accidents were typical according to the Commissioner. They occurred when either the child did not have a work permit or the employer did not file an employer's certificate.

Stevenson urges parents and employers to be sure that work permits and employer certificates are approved. He encourages them to contact the Bureau of Labor for permit and certificate applications and information on prohibited employment for minors.

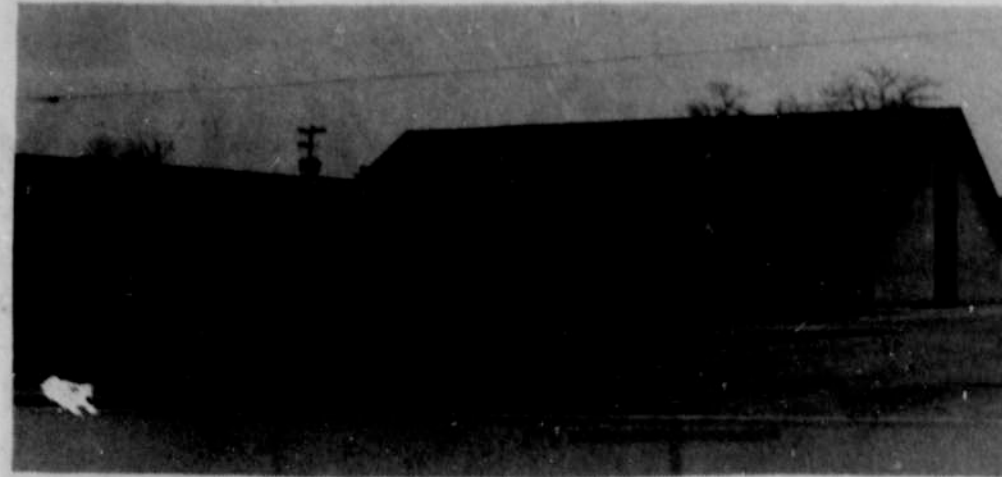
Michele Foster

First Christian Church at Vale

Vale to Dedicate New Church

The First Christian Church at Vale, Oregon was established in 1896 with 13 members. Until 1911 they met in various buildings and homes in town.

The old stone building at the corner of Cottage and "A" Street was dedicated in 1911. There are several church members who remember how the native stone was quarried east of Vale and hauled to the site. This building has served the congregation well over the years and has survived fire and flood.

The 1946 fire damaged the structure which was soon

repaired and in service again. Then in 1957 the building was flooded as Vale was covered with several feet of water. Again the members quickly repaired the damage.

In the early 1960's the congregation had grown to the point that two services were required each Sunday morning as they gathered to worship. In the mid-sixties a building fund was established and building and finance committees formed to plan the new structure.

Land was purchased near the high school on which to place the building, but before plans were completed for the new building the property

adjoining the old church became available and the land near the high school was sold and the entire block between "A" and Washington Streets was purchased.

On March 29, 1976 the congregation approved the plans for the new building, and just one year later, on April 3, 1977 the first services were conducted at which all members met at once for the first time in many years.

Dedication services for the new building will be held this Sunday, May 22, 1977 at 2:30 p.m. with an open house from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m.
