Brother Brigham Dramatization Slated for Payette June 6-7



Brigham Young, the Mormon prophet, nationally recognized by historians as America's greatest colonizer and one of the greatest American leaders and statesmen of the 19th century, will soon visit Idaho. A national tour of the remarkable, highly acclaimed, one-man theatrical production, "Here's Brother Brigham," produced by Liberty West Productions, will play two special performances at Payette High School, June 6 and 7. Advance tickets for the Payette performances can be purchased in Nyssa at Beck Realty and in Ontario at Gregg Brothers & Butler Realty thru Friday between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Tickets will also be sold at the door. General admission is \$3.50, student admission is \$2.50, and group rates are also available. Show time is 8 p.m. Both performances are sponsored by the Payette LDS Church. Well-known professional actor James Arrington is both script writer and performer for the show, winning audience praise, standing ovations, and rave reviews.

everywhere he performs. The Las Vegas Review Journal says "The play reveals the Mormon leader as a man of surprising warmth and wit. His opinions are delightful and perceptive." Howard Pearson, of the Deseret News calls it "A tremendous show...could join Mark Twain or Give 'Em Hell Harry as a one-man classic of the American Theatre." The Salt Lake Tribune labels the play "humorous, historically interesting and highly-entertaining...a fascinating man...an ageless Brigham." Perhaps the most touching praise came after a special performance for the descendants of Brigham Young at the Promise Valley Playhouse in Salt Lake City last June. According to Arrington, the production inspired by James Whitmore's portrayal of Will Rogers and Harry Truman and Henry Fonda's portrayal of Clarence Darrow. Arrington spent over a year researching and writing the script. After reading 30,000 pages of personal letters, hundreds of Brigham's speeches and a number of biographies, Arrington says, "Actually, Brigham wrote the script and I edited it." How does Arrington come across as the Mormon prophet? His appearance as compared to pictures of Brigham Young is "uncanny," says one reviewer. "I could swear I was seeing and hearing Brigham Young." Arrington's research into Brigham's New England and frontier voice qualities, well-trimmed mannerisms, gestures and expressions endear Brother Brigham to the audience," says another.
