

Nyssa Woman New Certified Graphoanalyst

Beverly Ann (Mrs. Robert M.) Taylor, 22 Emison Avenue, Nyssa, Oregon, has just received a certificate qualifying her as a Certified Graphoanalyst. The International Graphoanalysis Society based in Chicago, Illinois, granted the certificate to Mrs. Taylor after she successfully completed an 18-month extension course in the techniques of scientific handwriting analysis.

A Certified Graphoanalyst is trained to identify personality traits in people without the necessity of meeting them, using samples of their handwriting for analysis purposes.

Mrs. Taylor points out that the Graphoanalytical system of personality assessment is recognized as a valuable aid in counseling and is used by personal, marital, vocational and child guidance counselors in many parts of the world. She advises, too, that the services of Graphoanalysts are being used more and more in business to facilitate personnel selection, credit risk evaluation and also in questioned document examination work.

Certification authorizes Mrs. Taylor to prepare personality assessment reports based on Graphoanalysis for individuals and business firms; lecture to civic, service, and social organizations whose members may be interested in learning about the subject; and conduct introductory Basic Steps programs in Graphoanalysis for adult education groups in her community.
