Cool Discoveries for Dairy Month

Dairy case has cool and frosty whites for summer

Look to the wonderful assortment of ever ready and easily available dairy products for your first clue in bringing excitement to menus for warm summer days. We offer these cooling recipes for sampling in June Dairy Month.

A glass of milk is a refreshing drink and the basis for all kinds of flavorful beverage combinations. Discover for instance the frosty banana cooler. Start with milk, combine in a blender with a small sliced banana, a bit of sugar and some cracked ice. In a few seconds you'll come up with a light tropical drink. If your age and likes permit, include the rum, otherwise enjoy the unsprited refresher.

For a lovely fruit and cheese arrangement, it's a molded cottage cheese and yogurt salad offering its distinctive flavor and texture to go with succulent summer fruits. Try a simple duo of fresh vine ripened strawberries and cantaloupe or select a mixed melange of whatever fruits are available.

A nippy cheese pate is a new approach to the crackers and cheese routine. It should be made ahead of time and takes on a party look when molded in a fancy shape. The technique

is to melt both cream cheese and cheddar to blend the flavors and texture. Stir in dairy sour cream, a bit of minced parsley and wine, adding just enough plain gelatin to make the mixture hold its own shape. Spread it on crackers or melba toast, stuff it into celery or cherry tomatoes, or between slices of unpeeled cucumber sandwich fashion. It's a real mixer for all kinds of summer festivities.

The dairy case is full of cool and frosty supplies for summer meals. Make it your headquarters for menu planning.

Cool and Creamy Cheese Salad

- 1 envelope plain gelatin
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 pint small curd cottage cheese
- 2 cups plain yogurt
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon peel
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- Fresh strawberries and melon

Combine gelatin, sugar, salt and milk. Let stand 3 minutes, then stir over medium heat until dissolved. Mix in cottage cheese, yogurt, lemon peel and juice. Turn into 5-cup ring mold. Chill until firm, about 3 hours. Unmold and fill with fruit. Makes 6 servings.

"Jesus Wept." John 11:35

The passage above, "Jesus wept," is the shortest passage (verse) in the Bible. He was weeping over the death of Lazarus, a death he dealt with later in the same chapter. It makes me wonder if Jesus weeps today...would he shed tears over the deaths we cause each day; death brought about by the killing of Christ's spirit when we see it in others different in their religious beliefs than us? I rather think he would, and does!

At a member's yard sale, a few Saturdays ago, the member encountered someone who told her that her church membership "won't be held against you...." Surely, "Jesus wept." My member and I decided we couldn't overcome that sort of senseless murder to the Holy Spirit. Instead, we decided that such an attitude could bring about only one response from us, which is, "Thank you, and remember that God loves you."

The saddest thing about Nyssa, as I see it, is that such an attitude as described above is not that isolated. There is a discouraging lack of spiritual co-operation and fellowship between the churches. Many lay people and some pastors are willing to work together, but there are enough of the other kind to spoil any community sense of faith. Paul wrote of one body with many parts, warned against one part telling the others they are not needed. Here in town, it would appear, we have some hands and feet that work together spiritually. However, there are still many parts who insist they don't need any of the rest of the body. Who knows? I'm sure that Paul wept quite a bit, also.

Whoever you are; whatever your faith; wherever you worship; smile and rest easy, for God loves you. I pray that the weeping we cause Jesus may be changed to smiles for him and for all of us...Peace.

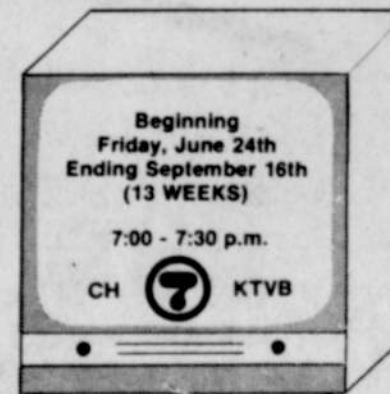
