Portrait of a Distinguished Citizen



W.L. McPartland

W.L. McPartland has put his shoulder to the plow as superintendent of Nyssa public schools.

McPartland, born and raised on a farm in Richland, Ore., spent seven years working on the first combine in Eagle Valley during the summers of 1931-38. He graduated from Eastern Oregon Normal School in La Grande in 1937 and took a position as teacher of a combined seventh and eighth grade classroom at Adrian, Ore.

In 1943, McPartland became principal of the combined elementary and junior high school in Nyssa. The job included a full six-period teaching load in mathematics and physical education as well as the principal's duties.

As the Nyssa schools grew, McPartland became supervising principal of the elementary school, a position he held until becoming superintendent of schools in 1958. When fire destroyed 90 per cent of the junior and senior high facilities in 1974, McPartland became involved with a 21-member building committee, which has since rebuilt almost all the facilities.

He has served two terms as president of the Eastern Oregon Elementary Principals' Association, has been president of the Oregon School Activities Association, a member of the legislative committee of the Superintendents' Association, member of the governor's special committee on migrant summer school programs in Oregon, and a member of the NEA-OEA Principals' Association.

McPartland received the Silver Beaver Award for his work with Boy Scouts in 1954 and has been active in the Lions Club.

He will retire from the Nyssa schools effective this June 30 after 40 years of teaching, a service that resulted in the elementary school's multipurpose building being named "McPartland Hall." The Nyssa School Board has provided a bronze plaque for the building, honoring McPartland for helping the youth of the community "to live and learn together in harmony, regardless of their economic, racial or other status."

"Mr. McPartland is one of the finest men I've ever worked for," said Meivin R. Mann, Nyssa Elementary School principal. "I can really relate to him because we don't have dual objectives. He's dedicated to working with the children and can readily understand the need to take on new projects to educate them. He's expert at handling budgets, too. The community will miss him."

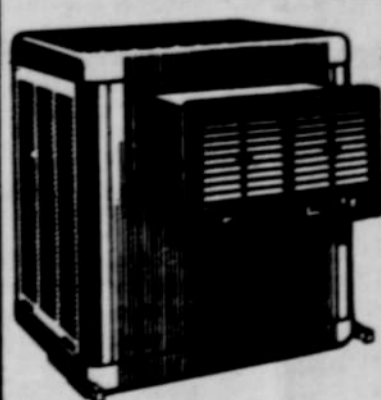
