Campers Find Water in Short Supply

Idaho Power Company reported Wednesday that a spring supplying campers at its Hells Canyon Park has dried up because of the drought, leaving the popular recreation facility without water for drinking and restroom operation.

However, environmental specialist C.W. Ryan said below-normal snow and rain this year in the mountains bordering the company's Hells Canyon hydro development has not yet affected water supplies at its three other major parks -- Woodhead, McCormick and Copperfield.

Ryan said the water supply in a 300-gallon tank serving Hells Canyon Park was exhausted last weekend and the company was forced to close the facility's restrooms, which also contain showers. The tank ordinarily is kept full by a spring fed by snow and rain in the mountains.

Users of the 10-acre park, located five miles downstream from Oxbow Dam, normally take water for drinking and cooking from faucets at its trailer spaces.

"We presently plan to keep Hells Canyon Park open despite the lack of water," Ryan said, "but campers should remember to take along their own supplies for drinking and cooking."

He said faucets and restrooms still are in operation at McCormick and Copperfield parks, as well as at Woodhead Park's picnic area.

Grass and trees at Hells Canyon Park will continue to be sprinkled with water from the nearby reservoir, Ryan said.

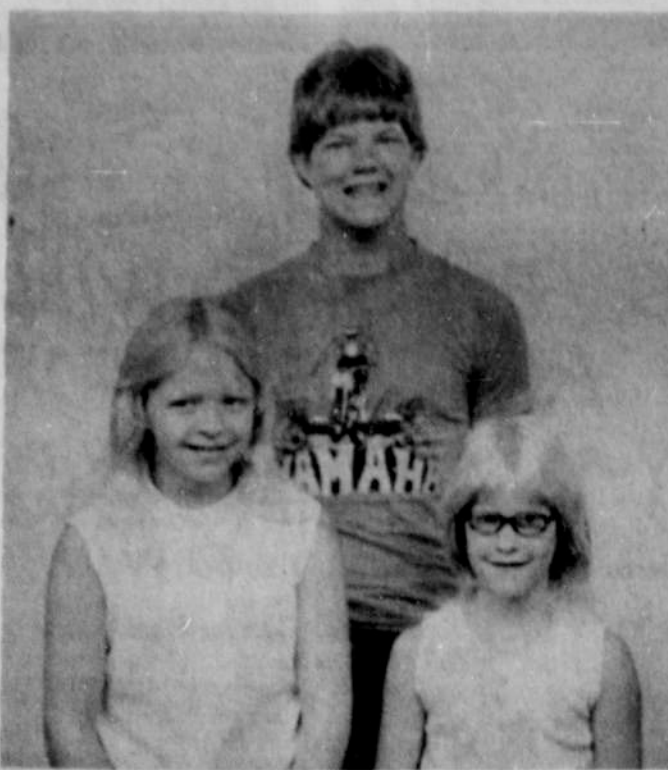

Four Oregon Groups Step Up Campaign

In an increased effort to help enforce Oregon's fish and game laws and to report vandals and other violators, four Oregon groups are joining forces to help bring about arrests and convictions.

Cooperating are the Oregon division of Izaak Walton League, the Oregon State Dept. of Fish & Wildlife, SOLV (Stop Oregon Litter & Vandalism), and the Oregon State Police. Lt. Ralph Loomis, State Police, said that the small wallet cards distributed for the last two years have helped bring about arrests and convictions especially for deer and elk poaching. The cards are compact (3-3/8"x2-3/8") and fit easily into a wallet, purse or pocket.

"More than 20,000 of the cards were distributed in the past two years," said Joseph W. Bennett, who prepared the cards for the Izaak Walton League. "With the new press run we will soon have 40,000 Oregonians with cards, all dedicated to obey the laws themselves and to watch for violators. I believe most Oregonians are fed up with the few careless people who willfully destroy public and private property and wildlife."

Bennett cited recent examples that have disgusted the

public: repeated break-ins and vandalism at Crown Point on the scenic Columbia River; illegal gillnetting in the Columbia and Willamette Rivers; snagging of fish in Oregon's low coastal streams due to the drought; poaching of deer and elk; bullet damage to transformers and power lines; break-ins and damage to vacation cabins; destruction of farmers' gates, fences and barns; littering of highways and trails, and arson fires. Oregon's dry weather makes it more important than ever to be extremely careful with fire.

Thefts of cedar logs from Federal and private timber lands have been reported lately, which has involved the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The State and private landowners continue to have trouble with off-road vehicles causing road damage, erosion and flooding in the Tillamook forest and other areas. Ranchers and tree farmers still experience litter problems including illegal rubbish dumping, a serious fire hazard. And vandals continue to destroy rest room facilities, picnic tables, signs, lawns, shrubs and trees, in addition to costly destruction of public school property.

"This is costing taxpayers many millions of dollars," Bennett said. "But I believe you can change peoples attitudes. I've done it myself

and have seen many people change their own attitudes and behaviour patterns."

1. The card holder commits himself or herself to obey and enforce Oregon laws, and insist that companions comply.

2. The police, who often feel citizens do not help them enough, know that there are many dedicated citizens willing to help.

3. Would-be vandals and violators may be deterred from their acts. When they realize that soon there will be 40,000 card carriers in the outdoors it may discourage the law breaker from performing his illegal acts.

"Preventing vandalism and violations before they happen is one of our primary goals," Bennett stated.

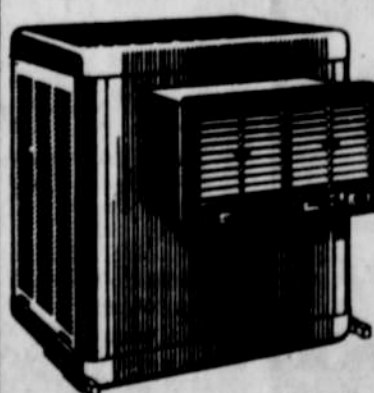
