



THE NYSSA PUBLIC LIBRARY presents a special exhibit of prints, pottery, and photography by the late Wayne Yoshiaki Takami.

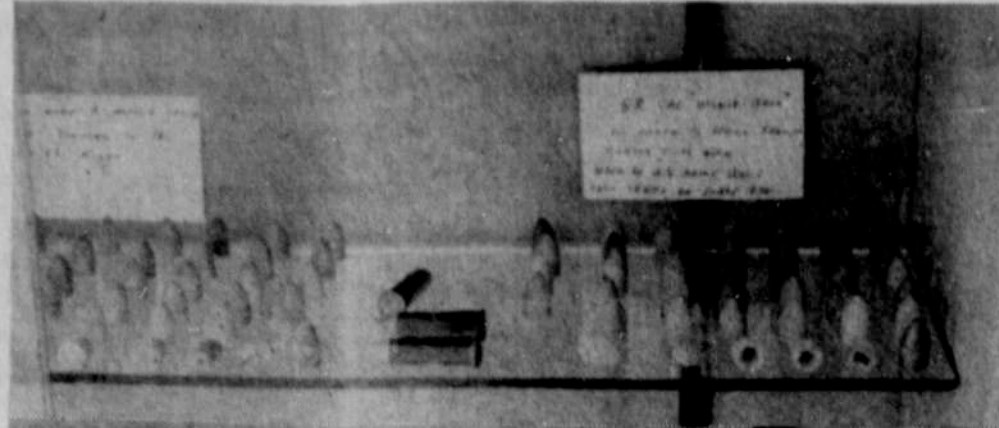
The presentation illustrates the positive influence and artistic diversity of one young man. This show is but a small sampling of the artist's work.

Pennies from Heaven

Reynolds Metals Company will donate one penny to the Muscular Dystrophy Association for every pound of aluminum recycled during August in the company's nationwide recycling program.

Theme of the program is "Pennies from Heaven" for Jerry Lewis and MDA. Reynolds officials say they expect collections to exceed ten million pounds in August, with the penny donation being in addition to the 17 cents a pound normally paid the public for aluminum. The recycler may keep that money or donate it to MDA.

The "Pennies from Heaven" campaign begins August 1 and continues through Labor Day, September 5, when Reynolds mobile units will be located at many of the TV stations participating in the Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon for Muscular Dystrophy.

In the Boise area, Reynolds aluminum recycling center is located at 4338 Chinden Blvd., Garden City, and is open to the public from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. Reynolds also maintains a regular mobile unit recycling schedule and collectors may call toll-free 1-800-243-6000 to find out the nearest aluminum recycling point to them.

Just insert your encoded VISA or First Courtesy Card into the machine's slot and tap out your personal security number. Next, press the "From Checking Account" button under the Cash Withdrawal section and tap out \$50.00. Then remove your card from the machine. That's it. The drawer opens and out comes your cash, plus a receipt showing that your transaction has been recorded as accurately as if you'd actually written a check.

How to get ready to bank anytime... at more than 40 FDNT locations in Oregon.

It's easy! If you already have a First Courtesy Card with your specially-encoded security number, or a VISA card with your account information encoded on it, you can begin using First Day & Night Teller services immediately. If your VISA card does not have a magnetic stripe on the back, or the proper encoding, you can have this service provided free by contacting First National.

Why it's safe.

First Day & Night Teller machine won't work unless the security number you tap out on the buttons matches the security number encoded on your VISA card or First Courtesy Card.

Which means that even if you lose your card and someone else finds it, they won't know your secret number. So they won't be able to work the machine with your card.

If you have a card, but can't remember your personal identification number, just come into First National's Ontario or Nyssa branch and we'll help you.
