Awards Ceremony Concludes Fair

The 68th annual Malheur County Fair closed Saturday night after perhaps entertaining record crowds. Figures are not yet available but estimates indicate Thursday night was the largest crowd ever and other days' attendance held up to a good average.

Saturday afternoon a number of awards were presented though some were given out at the close of certain competitions.

The market livestock sale concluded Friday's activities and youngsters with market animals will soon receive payment for their year's work.

The grand champion market swine owned by Lynelle Drake of Nyssa sold to Matthews Chevrolet for \$2.80 a pound, with a weight of 215 pounds. Laurie Witty, Adrian sold her 223 pound market pig to Feed Service of Nyssa for \$1.20 per pound. Three other high selling pigs were owned by Chris and Steffie

Schram of Ontario and Bobby Mahan of Jamieson. These brought \$1.30 per pound.

Ellen Joyce of Vale found Malheur Insurance buying her grand champion market lamb for \$2.70 a pound, with a weight of 125 pounds. Buddy Friend of Harper sold the reserve champion to U.S. Bank of Vale for \$1 a pound.

Terri Hill, Nyssa, had the second high selling lamb which brought \$2.30 a pound. The grand champion market steer of Frances Maher of Jordan Valley went to Dan Weblo Ford of Nampa and six other buyers. The Hereford weighed 1100 pounds and sold for \$1.15 per pound. Steve Westerberg of Vale sold his reserve champion steer for 75 cents a pound to Matthews Chevrolet. Second high selling steer was one owned by Connie Braniff which went for 82 cents a pound.

The traveling plaque for the highest scoring booth went to Oregon Trail Grange.

The best exemplification of fair theme award went to the Oregon Trail Grange while the Pomona Grange award for the most land products entries went to Boulevard Grange.

Pat Vincent received the Davis Jewelry award for the largest number of "placing" entries.

A vale youth, Kelly Johnson, received the traveling trophy for the best livestock breeding project with all breeds competing. Leonard Sherman, DVM, gave this award.

Johanna Moore, Vale, received the Kramer cash award for high individual livestock judge and Elaine DeLong, Willowcreek, the Braniff cash award as high individual dairy judge.

Kathleen Baltz, Jordan Valley, received the Bruce Hawkins memorial traveling trophy for the champion Hereford female. She also received the Eastern Oregon Hereford Breeders award and the Bill Stewart award and the Double I award for her project.

Seniors Told Not to Weatherize

Until Oct. 4

Senior citizens planning to weatherize their homes under a program adopted by the 1977 legislature must wait until October 4 to have any weatherization work performed, says John J. Lobdell, director of the Oregon Department of Revenue. The program provides up to \$300 to certain homeowners age 60 or older to help pay for weatherization which includes insulation, weather stripping and storm doors and windows.

October 4 is the effective date of the law. According to Lobdell, work performed before October 4 cannot be reimbursed under the program adopted in Senate Bill 4.

Lobdell cautioned senior citizens to check out any federal weatherization program that might be available. State funds are not available for persons eligible for a federal program and it is the responsibility of the seniors to find out whether they might be able to participate in a federal program.

Lobdell's agency will mail vouchers to persons who appear to qualify based on their 1976 property tax refund claims. After the weatherization work is completed, the voucher and copies of receipts must be returned to the department. A check reimbursing the seniors up to \$300 will be sent to them within a few weeks.

To qualify, a person must: --Be at least 60 years old. --Have a household income under \$7,500 in 1976. --Own his or her home, the assessed value of which was less than \$30,000 in 1976. --Have received a homeowner property tax refund for 1976.
