Pharmacy. "It takes some looking and some willingness to go where the jobs are. But they're available," Doerge said.

He calls pharmacy "a depression resistant occupation." Large numbers of pharmacists are not put out of work by economic slumps, Doerge explained. "Pharmacists continue to be needed and will in the future."

About 30 percent of the students in pharmacy at OSU are women now, it was noted.

"Historically, OSU has brought up the national average of women to men," Doerge stated. "Women are wanted in the profession and they can handle the science as well as the men, of course. I do see a change in the fact that more women are going into the profession with the idea that it's going to be full-time, rather than part-

time mixed with homemaking."

OSU has the only pharmacy school in the state and moved to a controlled enrollment program four years ago to keep facilities, especially laboratories, in balance with student numbers. More than 400 will be enrolled this fall.

Entry into the five-year pharmacy program comes at the junior year, Doerge explained. Then there's a Senior I and a Senior II year. Students may take the first two years of preparation (science, math, economics, sociology, psychology and communication courses) at any community college or another university. About 40 percent now take the full five years at OSU.

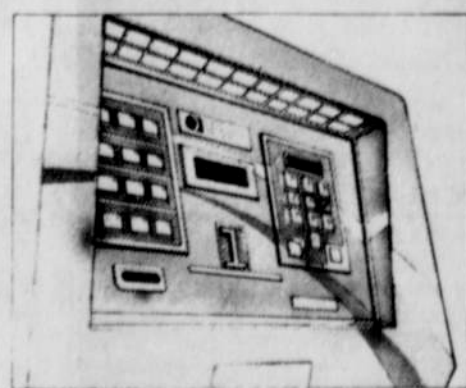
