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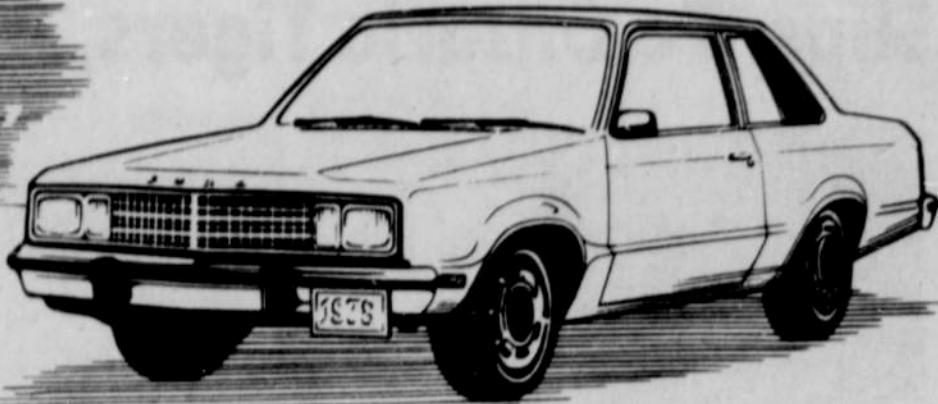

Retirement Income Credit Election

Some older Oregonians may now want to amend their 1976 income tax returns to claim the retirement income credit that has now been extended through 1976, according to Ralph Short, Internal Revenue Service District Director in Oregon.

The Tax Reduction and Simplification Act of 1977, he said, gives some taxpayers the option of reducing their tax liability for 1976 by choosing either the new tax credit for the elderly or the former retirement income credit. Previously, under the Tax Reform Act of 1976, the retirement income credit could not be used on 1976 tax returns since it was replaced by the tax credit for the elderly.

Short also advises taxpayers who claimed the tax credit for the elderly on their 1976 returns to consider recomputing their taxes to determine whether they could get a larger credit under former retirement income credit provisions.

In general, taxpayers over age 65 with larger incomes which substantially limit or completely eliminate eligibility for the tax credit for the elderly, will benefit by electing the retirement income credit, Short explained. Also, married individuals who filed separate returns and lived with their spouses

at any time during the year are not permitted to claim the tax credit for the elderly. Taxpayers in this situation may, however, be eligible for the retirement income credit.

Amended returns--Form 1040X--and new retirement income credit computation forms--1976 Schedule RIC (Form 1040)--are available at local IRS offices.

Foster Parents Offered Program in Dealing with Handicapped Children

Thanks to a Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), \$90,000 grant to the Children's Services Division, Portland State University's Department of Continuing Education will be offering a very unique training course for foster parents of handicapped children.

According to Project Director, Jan Hickman, "foster parents will gain skills and

understanding to help them meet the tremendous challenges of caring for handicapped individuals."

The three-term, 36 college credit course is scheduled to begin on September 21. There will be four classes each term and students will also have in-home training to practice the techniques learned in the course.

"We are convinced that this course will enable foster parents to cope with the myriad of problems encountered in raising handicapped children," said CSD Regional Manager, Joe Thimm.

"So often we loose foster parents simply because they don't know how to help these children," claimed Thimm.

The tuition is free and any interested foster parents are encouraged to contact Jan Hickman at Portland State University at 229-4896/229-4827. Staff of the Children's Services Division are welcome to attend classes at any time or to participate in the full curriculum.

Oregon Finds Olympic Committee

Alan Zell, Oregon Chairman for the United States Olympic Committee today announced the formation of "Oregon Committee for the Olympics" with the filing of papers of incorporation. With the changing purpose of the USOC as it meets the suggestions of the Presidents Commission on Sports, the aim of the "Oregon Committee for the Olympics" will be to bring together representatives of all sports bodies, be they Olympic/Pan American sports or not. Swainson's Hawk

The Swainson's Hawk (Buteo swainsoni) migrates the farthest distance of North American hawks. Traveling from as far south as Argentina, the hawks begin their spring migration, and arrive here in March and April. The large flocks arriving in early March continue north to Canada, while our summer residents do not arrive until a few weeks later.

This broad-winged hawk is easily recognized by its dull dark brown head, chest, back and primaries, and white neck and throat, which is its light phase of plumage. The heavy terminal band and many narrow strips of black and white across the tail are definite characteristics, even in the dark phase. The rare dark plumage consists of a white throat and dark body and wings.

Swainson's hawk, named for William Swainson, a 19th century English ornithologist is a tame, unaggressive bird, easily approached by man.

Very rarely do they attack an intruder.

They prefer open sagebrush country and construct their nests in trees at a height from 15 to 35 feet. The nests are particularly located in a tree to offer the incubating parent a good lookout on the surrounding area. Nests are built with large sticks, topped with twigs, weeds or grasses, lined with inner bark or fresh green leaves.

The 2-4 dull white eggs occasionally have brown spots. Incubation lasts for about one month and is shared by both parents. The young, hatching within several days of one another, are fed regurgitated food by their parents, and within two weeks are capable of eating small rodents and insects. By their fifth week, the young have lost most of their down, have grown their feathers, and are capable of flying.

The food habit of Swainson's hawks is highly beneficial to the farmer, because they feed primarily on injurious insects and rodents, rarely consuming birds. They will help rid his land of mice, ground squirrels, gophers, grasshoppers, crickets and locusts. They also eat frogs, lizards, and snakes.

Migration south occurs more because of the lack of available food, rather than the inability to withstand the cold. Many fly all the way to Argentina, where they flock to feed on migratory locust. A few winter in southeastern Oregon, parts of California, and New Mexico where they follow farmers plowing fields and hunt the mice and rodents they run over.

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
