At the regular meeting of the board of directors of the North Board of Control, Owyhee project, Tuesday evening, the date of October 13 was set to turn off the water for the season. Adam Focht, manager of the North Board, said that it is estimated that there will be around 316,000 acre feet in the reservoir at time of cutoff.
