A number of years before Mr. Holland ran the stage thru Vale on the Boise-Eldorado line. He served with General Howard in the Indian War. In 1887 the pioneers of this community decided that they wanted Malheur to be made a county, so Mr. Holland was sent to the legislature. Bob Lockett was the other representative and Lou Rinehart served as the senator. Baker County was divided and Malheur came into its own. Vale was selected as the county seat forty years ago.

Extension Office to Offer Course

Entitled "You, Your Child and Food"

Young homemakers in Malheur County will be particularly interested in a home-study course, "You, Your Child, and Food," which offers nutrition information and suggestions for feeding young children.

This free series of three lessons will be offered through the Malheur County Extension office beginning in early November. Upon request the course will be mailed to you for home study. Each lesson will be sent at two week intervals with brief assignments to be completed and returned to the County Home Economics Extension Office.

Because the early years in

a child's life are so important in development, sound nutrition, and healthy eating patterns are essential. Prepared by nutrition specialists at Oregon State University the course is geared for mothers with young children. Meal and snack ideas will be offered that are appealing to children, but also with an eye to nutrition.
